New York, Sept. 13. Gold 111; silver exchange 109; money 7 per cent.

The specie shipments to Europe today amount to \$11,540 in silver bars.

London, Sept. 13. Consols 92 1/2; breadstuffs quiet.

The British ship Papineau has captured a steamer in the Indian Ocean upon which there had been horrible suffering.

The small pox had again on board the ship, and out of 300 slaves taken on board 200 died, and the remaining 80 were terribly emaciated, from disease and want.

Seventeen persons were killed and severely injured by the steamer, and the express train from Victoria to Madrid.

The latest Spanish advices state that all the claims of the bill increasing the powers of the Government have been adopted by the Cortes.

It is reported that Don Alfonso, brother of Don Carlos, has left his command and returned to France.

Several persons who took an active part in the insurrection have been tried and condemned to death.

Paris, Sept. 13. Verdun was evacuated by the German troops this morning.

They left the town the streets were filled with rejoicing residents, and numbers of fugitives in charge of the balloons.

New York, Sept. 13. THE BURSTING OF THE BALLOON.

An immense crowd of people went to Brooklyn to see the balloon inflated.

The balloon was inflated, and many high buildings in the city, were covered with people who gazed with interest upon the process of inflation.

At ten minutes past the balloon suddenly swayed to the north and tipped half way around.

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STEAMBOAT BURNED.

The Mississippi steamer James Howard caught fire and was scuttled near Commerce, Miss., Friday. Loss—\$15,000.

There was a collision on the Pennsylvania Railroad at Wilmore, on Friday night, by which an engineer is killed and a woman wounded.

A passenger train and two freight trains came together and a terrible disaster was narrowly avoided.
