NEW YORK, Sept. 13. THE BURSTING OF THE BIG BALLOON. An immense crowd of people went to Brooklyn to see the balloon inflated. Many estimated the number as high as 50,000. The streets, avenues, and on the housetops in the vicinity, and many high buildings in this city, were covered with people with glasses to view its promised ascension. The process of inflation continued steadily during the day and afternoon. Many people believed there would be a bona fide ascension, but others were sceptical, owing to the fact that when Prof. Wise and son appeared at the gate of the grounds they were denied admittance, and were driven away by order of those in charge of the balloon. At ten minutes past 5 the balloon suddenly swayed to the north and ripped

suddenly swayed to the north and ripped half way around with a great tearing sound, and fell flat upon the ground. The immense volume of gas which had been pumped into it, nearly 400,000 feet escaped at the same moment, nearly suffocating ed at the same moment, nearly suffocating those who stood on the lee side. Police Inspector Folk and Police Commissioner Briggs had but an instant before shifted

Briggs had but an instant before shifted their positions, and thus escaped being buried in the netting and canvas. The crowd made a general rush over the rope with the intention of tearing up the balloon into small pieces and carrying them off as mementoes, but the strong force of police on the grounds charged and drove them back, but not before many succeeded. Mr. Stiver who had contracted to fill the balloon said it would be all folly to attempt another inflation, as the bag was not made of proper material, so the enterprise is abandoned for the present. Those having charge of the undertaking have made a great deal of money out of it.
