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CONCERNING THE MODERATION LEAGUE

An effort is being made by the Moderation League, recently organized in Halifax, to have the Temperance Act amended to permit the sale of beer and wine for beverage purposes. It is well to bear in mind these scientific truths: "Alcohol is a narcotic poison, and whether in beer, wine, or spirits, the poisonous action of Alcohol in the human system is the same. The evils that come from the use of Alcohol cannot be remedied by substituting one kind of alcoholic drink for another. A beer drinker becomes alcoholic without knowing it. Beer alcoholism is the most frequent, and most dangerous, because the most insidious. The man who drinks his half pint of wine daily, or the two glasses of beer, is just as surely submitting his body and mind to the deleterious effects of alcohol as the man who drinks whiskey. Injurious hereditary effects can be traced to the moderate use of alcohol by parents."

The sale of beer and wine was tried in the United States, before the enactment of prohibition, as a means of promoting temperance, and abundant evidence can be produced to show that the experiment failed. Wine drinking in France, and beer drinking in Germany, promoted the use of stronger liquors, and the increase of alcoholism.

The experience of Canadian provinces goes to show that the sale of beer and wine opens the door for the sale of spirits. Traffic in beer and wine is a part of the liquor business which has always been a social, moral and economic burden.

In view of these facts, it is incumbent upon men and women who desire the complete suppression of the liquor traffic to call upon our legislators not only to refuse to grant the petition for the Moderation League, but also to request the Government to provide for more effective enforcement of the Temperance Act.
