The Japanese banks, it is reported, are planning to establish branches in South America, Russia, India and other parts of the world, for the purpose of trade development. Japan is both progressive and ambitious and has a keen eye open for business opportunities.

OPTIMISM IN LONDON.

Victory Loan Takes British Nation by Storm.

Premier Lloyd George Returns From Rome Like a Conqueror, and a Feeling of Power Has Made the People of England Feel Actually Blithe Over War Situation.

LONDON, Jan. 15.—The week in London begins in a burst of optimistic sentiment. There is a balancing influence in the adverse conditions in Greece, where the nettle has not yet been grasped, and an unexpected crisis in Russia, but there is a sparkle in the Russian atmosphere as of clearing skies after a storm. The second item in the brightening situation, the magnificent financial strength shown by Britain to be getting more confident while borrowing the most colossal sum of money ever raised at one time on this planet, is a pointed illustration of the British temperament. They are actually blithe about it. One of the editorial headlines Sunday read: "Down With Dust," with exclamation point.

Bonar Law told them the other day, smilingly, but none the less firmly, that if they didn't lend it the Government knew another way to get it, and the audience of bankers tittered at the threat of confiscation. The prevailing cheerfulness is partly because it is now assured that this money and future amounts will be forthcoming as needed, partly because Germany has fallen into the very diplomatic hole dugged by her for the Allies, and partly because Lloyd George comes back like a conqueror. Not only did he bring success back from Rome, not only did he spread the sense of certain victory by his speech at the Guildhall, but the steady, settled confidence in his methods and Government is gripping the British public.

The Prime Minister is disappointing the prophets of evil by his successful working of the scheme of meeting and dealing directly with department heads instead of holding full Cabinet meetings, and by multiplying counsel dividing wisdom and efficiency. Thus he is proving his capacity for details while still keeping the large situation in view—"seeing the world steadily, and seeing it whole." Naturally in London Germany is not thought to have out a creditable figure in her mixup of whining and blustering by turns, and has diminished the fear of her prowess. "How can a people so great be ruled by a man and government who talk such rubbish?" sums up London club opinion of the latest Berlin outgivings. The impression made is of a defeated man flinching from an approaching retribution. The man who have known Germany since the war tell me that the solidarity of the German people themselves is the stake for which the Kaiser is playing.

Discharging an Army.

LONDON, Jan. 15.—It is estimated that between six and eight millions of persons now employed by the Government, representing half the wage-earning population of the United Kingdom, will have to be discharged at the end of the war, according to the report of the Committee on Labor Problems After the War. All these workers will not be discharged simultaneously, but it is probable that within two months after peace has been declared some two or three million workers will be turned off.

Regarding the army demobilization, the committee calculates that the rate of discharge cannot exceed five thousand daily, at which rate six months would be occupied in demobilizing less than one million of the huge army.

Will Blame Allies.

LONDON, Jan. 15.—It is reported by the Amsterdam correspondent of the Exchange Telegraph Co., that on the occasion of Emperor William's forthcoming birthday (he will be 58 years of age on Jan. 27), Emperor Charles of Austria-Hungary, King Ferdinand of Bulgaria, and the Turkish heir-apparent will go to Berlin to attend the birthday celebrations, and that while they are there the three rulers and the Turkish representative will issue a manifesto to the world, placing responsibility on the Entente for continuation of the war. The Sultan of Turkey will not attend the celebration, on account of his advanced age.

To Avenge His Son.

BELLEVILLE, Jan. 15.—Pte. James D. Ross, who enlisted with the 59th Battalion last spring, shortly before it sailed for England, returned home Saturday evening. He lost his son, Gunner Leo Ross, on May 1, 1915, who was killed by the explosion of a shell at Ypres, and enlisted last spring in order to get revenge. Quite a few months ago Pte. Ross was wounded in the back by a shell, and at first was thought to be in a rather dangerous condition, but he recovered somewhat and has been invalided.

Taxing Non-Fighters.

PARIS, Jan. 15.—The Chamber is discussing a bill on economy. The most interesting proposal has been presented by M. Ramell in the nature of a war tax. The tax would affect those who, although of an age for service, are for some reason exempt from service in the army. The tax would be fixed at the amount of 12 francs, besides a proportional sum calculated on the principle of income tax.

Many at Monte Carlo.

PARIS, Jan. 15.—Playing "trente et quarante" at Monte Carlo recently a man won \$12,000 in two days and in less than two hours lost it again, and another \$12,000 as well. So many people are there now that an extra roulette wheel has replaced the fountain in the centre of the grand hall.

TEUTONS NEAR GALATZ

Great Roumanian Trade Centre is Now Threatened.

Strong Attacks Made by Germans in the Valleys of Putna, Sionika, Troitus, and Slatina Were Checked by the Russian Artillery, and Other Hun offensives Also Failed.

LONDON, Jan. 15.—Assailing the Russian lines on a ten-mile front along the Lower Sereth, Mackensen's troops swept the defenders back Saturday and carried the villages of Vadeni and Kotumikhall. Vadeni is on the Braila-Galatz railroad, six miles south-west of the important Roumanian trade centre of Galatz, the last stronghold on the Danube remaining in the hands of the Russians. Kotumikhall is on the Sereth, north-west of Galatz.

In the mountains and plains of western Moldavia the Teutonic forces pressed ahead at only one point, carrying by storm a mountain top south of the Oltuz road and taking fifty prisoners. Strong attacks by the Austrians and Germans in the valleys of the Putna, Sionika, Troitus, and Slatina were beaten back by the fire of the Russian and Roumanian batteries. In the eastern Carpathians, north of the Golden Bistritza River, German grenadiers raided several Russian positions.

In the centre of the Germanic front, near Fokhany, unfavorable weather conditions limited the fighting. Attempts by the Germans to assume the offensive near Radulesch, north of the Sionika River and south of the Oltuz River, were repulsed by the Russians, who themselves made no efforts to improve their position.

Sunday's Russian report says: "The Austrians attempted to attack east of the Putna, but were repelled by our fire. Their attacks north of the Sionika River and south of the Oltuz River were repulsed. The enemy attacked the Roumanians six versts west of Braila and eighteen versts south of the confluence of the Slatina and Troitus Rivers, but were repulsed by our fire. The enemy detachments which attempted to assume the offensive in the region of Radulesch, ten versts east of Fokshany, were driven back to their trenches by our fire."

"The enemy, three regiments strong, and supported by artillery, launched an attack against our advanced guards from Kotumikhall on the Sereth as far as Vadeni, ten versts southwest of Bialoy. After repelling several attacks our advanced detachments abandoned the village of Kotumikhall under pressure of superior enemy forces."

TWO SUBS CAPTURED.

Italians Report Important Success on the Sea.

ROME, Jan. 15, via Paris.—The capture of two submarines is reported in an announcement Sunday from the War Office. The statement follows:

"The enemy submarine VC12, which the German navy ceded to Austria-Hungary, has fallen into our hands and become a unit of our torpedo squadrons. Another enemy submarine the VT12, belonging to the Austro-Hungarian navy, also is in our possession."

"Italian and French hydroplanes on Friday dropped bombs on the enemy's works at Pola. Bombs made a counter-attack, but were repulsed. One of our hydroplanes successfully fought three enemy airplanes."

"Enemy airplanes bombed our torpedo boats at sea without effect. All our units returned to their base undamaged."

Jap Warship Destroyed.

TOKIO, Jan. 15.—The Japanese battle cruiser Teikoku was destroyed by an explosion Sunday in the harbor of Yokosuka. Fire on the Teikoku caused the magazine to blow up. One hundred and fifty-three members of the crew of the Teikoku were killed and 157 injured, many of them seriously. Numerous members of the ship's company were rescued from the water. Most of the officers of the cruiser were ashore. The cause of the explosion is not known.

The Teikoku was laid down in 1905, and displaced 13,750 tons. She was 440 feet long, and was armed with four 12-inch, twelve 6-inch, twelve 4.7-inch, and four 3-inch guns, three 3-pounders and five torpedo tubes. Her complement was 817 men. Yokosuka is an important naval station, thirteen miles southwest of Yokohama.

Dies After Shovelling Snow.

ELMIRA, Jan. 15.—David D. Ratz, manager of the local branch of the Royal Bank, here, died suddenly Saturday morning shortly after re-entering his house after shovelling snow off a sidewalk. He was overcome by a fainting spell and died a few minutes later. He was a son of the late John Ratz, one of Elmira's pioneers, and was 40 years of age. He entered the Traders Bank as a clerk and when the Traders was taken over by the Royal Bank was retained as manager. He is survived by his wife, a three-year-old son, his mother, and two brothers, Major J. H. Ratz of Preston, with the Canadian Overseas force, and George Ratz of Elmira, and one sister, Mrs. McMurtry of London.

No Transport Sunk.

LONDON, Jan. 14.—According to an Amsterdam despatch the Berlin Government has issued the following official statement:

"One of our submarines on December 28, sank a British transport in the English Channel. The transport was steaming with dark red lights and measured about 8,000 tons. She was conveyed by destroyers."

In making denial of this announcement, the secretary of the British Admiralty said Saturday night: "The above report is absolutely untrue."
