



Charles J. Doherty, Law, 1876

MCGILL'S representative in the Dominion Cabinet, the Right Honourable Charles J. Doherty, Minister of Justice for Canada, is a McGill man in the fullest meaning of the word. The most brilliant student in his class, he graduated with honours, winning the Elizabeth Torrance gold medal. In 1893, he took the degree of D.C.L. He was for many years Professor of Civil and International Law at the University, while at the same time he was a leading advocate of Montreal. He became a Judge of the Superior Court in 1891 and occupied a seat on the bench for fifteen years. Resigning his judgeship to enter politics, Mr. Doherty was, in 1908, elected member of Parliament for

the St. Ann division of Montreal. In 1911 he became Chief Justice in the Borden administration. In recognition of his services to the country, and especially as one of Canada's representatives at the Peace Conference, Mr. Doherty was created an Imperial Privy Councillor in the New Year's Honours List of 1920.

THE HONOURABLE JOHN D. MACLEAN, Minister of Education and Provincial Secretary in the Government of British Columbia, is a medical graduate of McGill University. Very early in life his interest in education was apparent, for at the age of sixteen he was granted a temporary teacher's certificate in his native province of Prince Edward Island. Later he taught in the public schools of British Columbia. Abandoning the teaching profession, he came to study medicine at McGill and after graduation practised for a number of years in Canada and the United States. Always prominent in the public life of the community, Dr. MacLean, in 1915, received the Liberal nomination in the electoral district of Greenwood, B.C., and in the following year was elected to a seat in the Legislative Assembly of that Province. On the formation of the Government under the Premiership of the late Honourable H. C. Brewster, Dr. MacLean was given the portfolio of Minister of Education and Provincial Secretary. Under his administration many improvements have been made in the educational system and in the Public Health Department of the Province.
