THE MARKET REPORTS.

Grain is Firmer—The Live Stock and Cheese Quotations.

Wednesday Evening, June 17.
Toronto St. Lawrence Market.

The grain receipts at St. Lawrence Market this morning amounted to 399 qu bushels.

Wheat—One hundred bushels of white sold at 75¢ per bushel, and 100 of goose sold at 75¢ per bushel.

Barley—One hundred bushels of low grade sold at 45¢ per bushel, and 100 of high grade sold at 45¢ per bushel.

Dressed Hogs—Trade was a little quiet, and the market is quoted unchanged at 7.75 to 8.25 per cwt. or choice light weight butcher hogs, and 75.00 to 87.00 for heavy.

Hay—About 15 loads were on the market. No. 1 timothy is quoted at 22 to 25 per ton, and mixed or clover is firmer at 18 to 20.

Straw—Two loads were sold. Prices ranged from 7 to 8.50 per ton.

Cheese Markets.

Peterboro, June 17.—At the cheese market here to-day there were 3,880 boxes of cheese, all colored; first half of June make; 1,108 boxes sold at 11 7-16c and the balance at 10 15-16c; 100 boxes of June make.

Stirling, June 17.—At Stirling Cheese Board to-day 1,285 boxes of white and 1,066 boxes of colored cheese offered. The bidding ranged from 10 15-16c to 10 7-16c; there were no sales on the board and 12 buyers were present.

Woodstock, June 17.—At the regular meeting of the Woodstock Cheese Board here there were 1,285 boxes of white and 1,066 boxes of colored cheese offered. The bidding ranged from 10 15-16c to 10 7-16c; there were no sales on the board and 12 buyers were present.

Madoc, June 17.—Fifteen factories boarded 1,000 boxes of cheese here to-night. Sales: Walking 270, Hodgson 55, Alexander 75, Ayer 100, Brenton 250, Magrath 250, all at 10 15-16c.

Picton, June 17.—Thirteen factories boarded 1,240 boxes; highest bid, 10 9-16c; all colored; all sold.

Montreal Live Stock.

Montreal, June 17.—Trade at the Eastern Market was dull to-day, and prices were about the same.

Cattle—Receipts amounted to 80 head, most of which were of good quality. The demand for them was slow, and at noon 100 remained unsold. Sales: 40 to 45¢; medium, 35¢ to 40¢; common, 25¢ to 30¢; canners, none.

Hogs—Receipts amounted to 800 head, the quality being mostly common. The demand was good, and at noon none remained unsold. Poor stock sold at 11 to 12¢, and good at 12.50 to 13¢. Good demand for calves.

Sheep and lambs—Receipts of sheep amounted to 800 head, those 4¢ lambs amounting to 400 head. The sheep brought from 2 to 3 1/2¢, lambs selling at 3 to 3.50. The demand was good.

Hogs—Receipts of hogs amounted to 500 head. The demand was slow and prices ranged from 9 to 10.10.

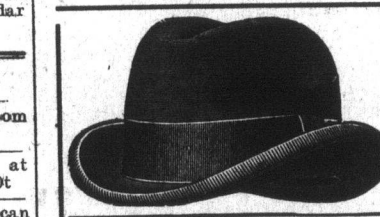
