A SANITARY OASIS.

Housing at Battersea One of the Ideals of John Burns' Childhood—Description of the Latchmere Dwellings.

The ceremony of opening the Latchmere estate in Battersea, which consists of two, three, four, and five-roomed tenements, erected by the local borough council for the housing of the working classes, was performed recently by Mr. John Burns, M.P. The inauguration proceedings were presided over by Mr. A. W. Raynor (the Mayor of Battersea), and among others present were Lord Monkswell (chairman of the London County Council), the Earl of Carrington, and the members of the borough council. Mr. Burns said he had the proud satisfaction of seeing realized in bricks and mortar one of the ideals of his early days. In his salad days he had had the temerity to declare that if only this Latchmere estate were covered with healthy dwellings it would be converted into



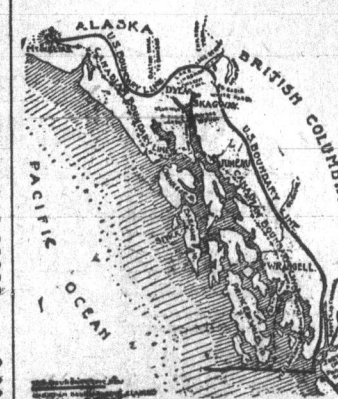
a sanitary oasis in a desert of jerry-built houses. Here to-day, in these handsome tenements, with their baths, their gymnasiums, and their recreation-grounds, which he now declared ready for occupation, was the oasis, and there (pointing in the direction of Battersea Park road) was the desert of jerry-built houses. By supplying each of these tenements with a bath, the Borough Council, the first London municipality to create such a colony, had done their best to remove the taint which described the working-classes as the unwashed, and by refusing to allow either beer-shop or off-licence on the estate they were determined to nullify that other taint that they were more drunken than they ought to be. Mr. Burns then formally declared the new houses open.

There are three types of houses, with three, four, and five rooms respectively. The height of all rooms is 8 ft. 9 in. Each tenement has its separate entrance and back garden. The living rooms are fitted with combined food cupboard and dresser, and a special feature in the kitchen, or living room, and the scullery, or bath-room is a combined kitchen range, cooper, and bath. Electricity is everywhere available on the penny-in-the-slot system. When finished there will be 173 houses for 315 families. Their total cost will be £105,000, and the rents range from 7s. 6d. to 11s. 6d. a week.

ALASKA BOUNDARY LINE.

As Defined by Tribunal's Recent Decision—Lynn Canal Section.

The first map shows the boundary between Canada and Alaska, as decided by the Treaty Commissioners. The United States claimed rights over the Portland Canal, but this contention the Commission has set aside and puts that channel entirely



under British control. The Canadian claim interpreted the treaty as meaning the line from headland to headland of the coast, thus including in Canadian territory not only Dyak and Skagway, but almost the entire length of Lynn Canal; also Glacier Bay, in which the famous Muir glacier is situated, and other important points along the coast. Under the finding all this territory will remain under control of the United States. The United States boundary, as defined by the decision of the Commission,



tion, now ascends slightly west of Portland Channel, and the claim of the Canadians, that their boundary should start up the northern arm of the Echin Canal, is declared to be untenable.

A Wonder of Precocity.

Christian Heinicke was born at Lubeck on the 6th of February, 1721. When only ten months old he could repeat every word spoken to him. At twelve months of age he had memorized all the principal events in the Pentateuch. Before he had finished his second year of existence he had learned all the historical parts of both the Old and the New Testament. At the age of three he could reply correctly to all questions put to him regarding universal history and geography, and in the same year he learned to speak both Latin and French.

In his fourth year he employed his time in studying religions, especially the history of the Christian church. He was not only able to gibber repeat all that he had read, but was also able to reason with considerable judgment and to give his own opinion of things in general. The king of Denmark wished to see this wonderful child, so he was taken to Copenhagen. After his return to Lubeck he learned to write and was beginning on the study of music and mathematics; but, his constitution being very weak, he took down and died on June 27, 1725, aged four years, four months and twenty-one days. What a wonderful record for such a short life!

Buttered Loops.

In Abyssinia one method of doing the hair that is adopted by warriors is to stroll into the market place, buy a pound of butter and, putting it upon the top of the hair, stand still while the sun arranges things. When the hair is thus dressed with melted butter the Abyssinian knows that fate cannot or will not touch him. He is a picture of well dressed elegance done in oils. Another style is to tress the hair, and every tress means something. A young warrior with a head of hair untressed is of no account. He has not yet killed a man. When, however, he has done so all his hair is shaved except enough to make one tress, which is of the same significance as a notch on a pistol stock. Crimoline.

Crimoline had its origin in a woven fabric composed of hair and linen (fax) warp; hence the name. This fabric was first used for shoes, then for bonnets, the word being coined in 1830. As this article was costly and did not extend the dress to the desired bulk light steel hoops were fitted with tape upon the bird cage principle. So popular was the crimoline in 1862 that the rolling of the steel developed a great trade in Sheffield, and one firm alone averaged an output of from ten to fifteen tons a week. Several deaths occurring by fire through the use of crimoline killed the fashion, but Dr. Richardson in his "Field of Diseases" gives an instance of a lady escaping from the effects of being struck by lightning by the hoops acting as conductors.

Rearranging the Beds.

The eggs of the snipe and plover groups are proportionately exceedingly large for the size of the bird, and the saving of space by this arrangement undoubtedly answers a purpose.
