The post office was established in 1851, W. D. Soules first P. M. Mr. Soules opened the first store in 1850. Within three miles of the village are the Sulphur Springs, in Tuscarora. There are four churches, Episcopal, Rev. W. Duane; Wesleyan and Episcopal Methodist, and Baptist, Rev. T. Booker. The manufacturing establishments are, a gfist and two saw mills. The school averages 100 pupils.
