ONONDAGA:

A village and station of the Buffalo and Lake Huron Railway, on Brantford street, and on a branch of the Grand River, township of Onondaga, nine miles from Brantford. It was laid out in 1845 by the Grand River Navigation Company. The post office was established in 1851, W. D. Soules first P. M. Mr. Soules opened the first store in 1850. Within three miles of the village are the Sulphur Springs, in Tuscarora. There are four churches, Episcopal, Rev. W. Duane; Wesleyan and Episcopal Methodist, and Baptist, Rev. T. Booker. The manufacturing establishments are, a grist and two saw mills. The school averages 100 pupils.

ONONDAGA MILLS—flouring—Squire & Harold—steam—two run of millstones. Engine 25 horse; employs three hands; capacity 150 bushels a day.
