and a deep appreciation of his highest ideals and aims, albeit with an open-eyed sense of his foibles and eccentricities. If he meets the difficulties and hardships of his arduous and ill-paid career with heroic endurance and unflinching faith, she matches his heroism with her own. She is his brave and trusty comrade till he dies, and when, at the close of a brief period of superannuation, she lays his worn-out frame to rest in the country graveyard, after a brief return to "the world", she betakes herself to the humble dwelling which had been their first parsonage, there to await the great reunion.

T. & T. Clark's (Edinburgh, U. C. Tract Society, Toronto) recent publications include the following: The Self-Revelation of our Lord, by J. C. V. Durell, B.D. (224 pages, \$1.50 net). Admitting the limit placed upon the dogmatic teaching of Jesus during His earthly ministry, the author shows that important truths relating to His own Person lay implicit in much that He said and did, which subsequently became explicit in the light of the Resurrection and under the guidance of the Holy Spirit. The teaching of the apostles is exhibited as a gradual unraveling of the meaning of Jesus' teaching. Israel's Ideals: Or Studies in Old Testament Theology, by Rev. John Adams, B.D. (232 pages, \$1.35 net), the purpose and scope of which may be seen from the author's suggestive statement, that as the Old Testament is the "hinterland" of the New, the Old Testament has its hinterland in the wider and more primitive religion of the Semites. To place the religious ideas of Israel in the setting of their relation to the past as well as the future is the task essayed in this little book; and the task, as one might expect from the author of, Sermons in Syntax and, Sermons in Accents, is well done. The Mission and Ministration of the Holy Spirit, by Arthur Cleveland Downer, M.A., D.D. (341 pages, \$1.75 net), a comprehensive discussion of the relation of the Third Person to the First and Second in the Trinity, and of His work in the church and the hearts of individuals. Marcus Aurelius and the Later Stoics, by F. W. Bussell, D.D., Vice-Principal of Brasenose College, Oxford (302 pages, \$1.00), in The World's Epoch-Makers series, edited by Oliphant Smeaton.

Three exceedingly useful little books for the Sunday School worker are: The Graded Sunday School in Principle and Practice, by Henry H. Meyer (Eaton & Mains, New York, 238 pages, 75c. net), one of a series of modern Sunday School Manuals, edited by Charles Foster Kent in collaboration with John T. McFarland: Stories and Story-Telling in Moral and Religious Education, by Edward Porter St. John, A.M., Pd.M. (The Pilgrim Press, Boston, 100 pages, 50c. net); and Familiar Talks on Sunday School Teaching, by C. F. Hunter, B.A. (J. W. Butcher, London, 159 pages, 25c.). To this trio may be added Milton S. Littlefield's, Hand-Work in the Sunday School, published a couple of years ago for the New York Sunday School Commission, by The Sunday School Times . Company, Philadelphia (162 pages, \$1.00 net).
