We have received the prize list of the New York Horse Show, which will be held in Madison Square Gardens from Nov. 15 to 20, inclusive. This show is of considerable importance to Canadian horse breeders, especially to the breeders of Hackney and saddle horses. In most of the classes three prizes are awarded. The 1st prize is \$200, the 2nd \$100, and the 3rd \$50, though in a few cases \$150 is the amount of the 1st premium, and the other two reduced to correspond. This year we notice that the premiums have been reduced in one of the classes for hunters—high jump, open to all. Last year the prizes were \$300 for 1st, \$150 for 2nd, and \$75 for 3rd; this year, \$200, \$150 and \$75 respectively. This is, no doubt, owing to a couple of new sections having been added for brood mares in the Thoroughbred class. The total amount of premiums is \$33,000. The following arrangements have been made with the leading railroads to carry exhibits to and from the show: The full tariff retes will be charged on stock going to the exhibition, but if unsold and returned within thirty days after the close of the show they will be carried free by the line which carried them to the exhibition.
