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# The Farmers' Market

Oats Barley Flax

#### WINNIPEG MARKET LETTER

(Office of The Grain Growers' Grain Company Limited, September 14, 1914)

Wheat—Prices have had a heavy break this past week, pressure due to heavy offerings of cash wheat arriving from country points as well as large decline in both the principle American markets being the cause. At the outset prices were lower, the United States markets breaking on profit taking going thereby the general public who bought on the sensational rise a couple of weeks ago and commercial selling making the undertone weak. As the week advanced values here gradually worked lower on all futures, hedging sales and lack of a general export demand helped the decline which at the close today was from 7c. to 8c. Country arrivals are running quite heavy, averaging well over 1,200 cars per day and grading mostly 2 Northern and 3 Northern. The cash demand was keen earlier in the week when offerings of spot wheat were scant, but later arrivals got heavier and buyers backed away, premiums gradually disappeared.

Oats—Following the decline in wheat here and pressure in oats in Chicago put prices 5c. to 6c. down.

The cash demand continues keen at the going prices.

Barley—Demand indifferent and prices 1c. to 2c. lower.

Flax—Market erratic, closing figures are 6c. lower.

### Winnipeg Livestock

Stockyard Receipts

Receipts of livestock at the Union stockyards during the past week have been as follows:—3,618 cattle, 80 calves, 5,038 hogs and 594 sheep.

Cattle

The receipts during the past week of cattle at the yards have continued light. Demand both fro a the South and East has been very good and this together with local demand has acted to give the trade a very firm tone all week. Prices accordingly rule largely as those of last week, best stockers and feeders selling around \$6.75, with a few extrachoice animals at a slightly higher figure. Choice butcher steers of good weight are, some of them, reaching as high as \$7.75, altho the ruling quotation is \$7.50. There is a good sale for choice, thick, fat cows, but little change is noticed in oxen and bulls. Springers and milkers have again reached steady prices, altho sale of such stock is slow. There is no change in veals, the best selling from \$85.50 to \$7.00.

Hogs

The hog market has been somewhat love.

The re is no change in veals, the best selling from \$86.50 to \$87.00. Hogs

The hog market has been somewhat lower this week owing to sympathy with a decline in the markets to the South. The price now is \$8.75. The same deductions as were noted last week, namely, sows docked \$1.50 per cwt., stags \$3.00 and light weight pigs under 150 lbs., \$1.50 per cwt., continue in force, hence it is advisable if shippers wish to obtain the highest prices that careful buying and grading be done before sending to the market.

Sheep

This week the lamb market has been oversupplied and as a consequence prices have dropped somewhat. Best lambs are selling at \$7.00 per fundred, with a range of from \$6.50 to \$7.70. Choice wethers are quoted at \$5.50 to \$6.00 and choice ewes \$5.00 to \$5.50.

## Country Produce

Note. Quotations are Lo.b. Winnipeg, except those for cream, which are Lo.b. point of shipment.

Butter

The demand of housekeepers for butter just now is noticeably very slack, due no doubt to the unsettled condition of affairs caused by the war, and on this account there is no change in the price paid by local dealers for butter this week. Added to this lack in demand is the fact that a large amount of the butter receipts is of a very inferior quality, this having a depressing effect upon the price. Fancy dairy butter will sell for 23 cents, No. I dairy at 20 cents and good round lots at from 17 to 18 cents.

Eggs

Constantly dealers are complaining about the poor quality of the egg shipments. It is unfortunate that this should be the case, because with a little attention in having the eggs first infertile then selecting and canding them, a very much more uniform product would result, naturally receiving a much better price. This week dealers quote eggs subject to candling at 20 to 21 cents per dozen.

Potatoes

The potato situation is a somewhat problematical one at present. So far the outlook warrants dealers expecting that prices will be higher all round for potatoes during the coming winter. The crop in most points in the West is practically a failure, thousands of bushels being required this year for local consumption having to be brought in from more favored areas. So far reports foretell a very good crop in the East, but altogether it will take another month before the situation can be sized up with any degree of accuracy. Dealers are paying 65 to 70 cents per bushel this week and these are retailing at 95 cents.

Milk and Cream

There is no change in prices for milk and cream during this week, sweet cream selling at 30 cents per pound of butterfat, sour cream at 24 cents and the price of milk continues \$2.00 per hundred pounds during September.

Hay

There is no change in hay prices this week, the supply is a little better, but the demand continues good. No. 1 Red Top sells for \$12 per ton, No. 1 Upland \$12 per ton, and No. 1 Timothy \$17 per ton Potatoes
