TAYLOR'S PERFORMANCE WAS ONE OF REAL PITCHING NERVE

Red Sox Put Their Hurler In Bad on Several Occasions, But He Came Thru, Beating Yate's Crew 9-4.

Nothing but the superb pitching of the veteran, Ed Taylor, in the face of trying circumstances not of his own making, gave the Red Sox the margin yesterday over the Hamilton Athletics by a 9-4 score. Taylor's work, when diagnosed to the last degree, was really one of the best pitching feats witnessed on the local diamond in many moons. It is all very well for any mound artist to go along without a break in his support, and roll up nine goose eggs on the score board against his opponents, but to pitch a game where on every occasion where Dame Fortune kicks in, she does kick in with the bad breaks against you and knocks the props from under your feet, then Mr. Pitcher is there with some nerve and some stuff to stick it out and finally smother the enemy.

As a real game pitcher, commend Mr. Eddie Taylor to us. They may say that Mr. Taylor always works on the supposition that it is a long way around the base paths to the pay station, and while the enemy is seeking transportation around, Mr. Taylor is busy retiring the side. He did this effectively yesterday, but there were occasions when the rails were greased, the Red Sox contributing no less than four juicy miscues in the box score, and almost as many more not seen therein.

To begin with Manager Yates paraded forth in white silk socks, enough to hoodoo any team, and it was a sorrowful spectacle said socks presented when they beat it with the owner's hooks at the conclusion of hostilities. The Red Sox, having gone almost hitless for two days at St. Thomas, were due to murder some pitcher. Yesterday they murdered three, and Hamilton was their meat. But at that, with the loose fielding

singles followed by Gilhooley's double, which Dolan misjudged, did the trick. From the sixth on, Hamilton failed to get a man on bases.

The Red Sox, however, were not appeased. In the sixth Dolan struck out both Burns and Wagner, and then Deneau, Ivers and Dolan hit safely, netting one run. In the eighth with Stark pitching, Honeck's liner to left scored Deneau and Ivers.

All during the latter part of the fracas, we watched those white socks in the erstwhile Hamilton manager. They nervously twitched and kicked. From the press box only the Sox were visible, but if the plot of any great drama ever hinged around a pair of white hose, there was both plot and drama perfectly staged. 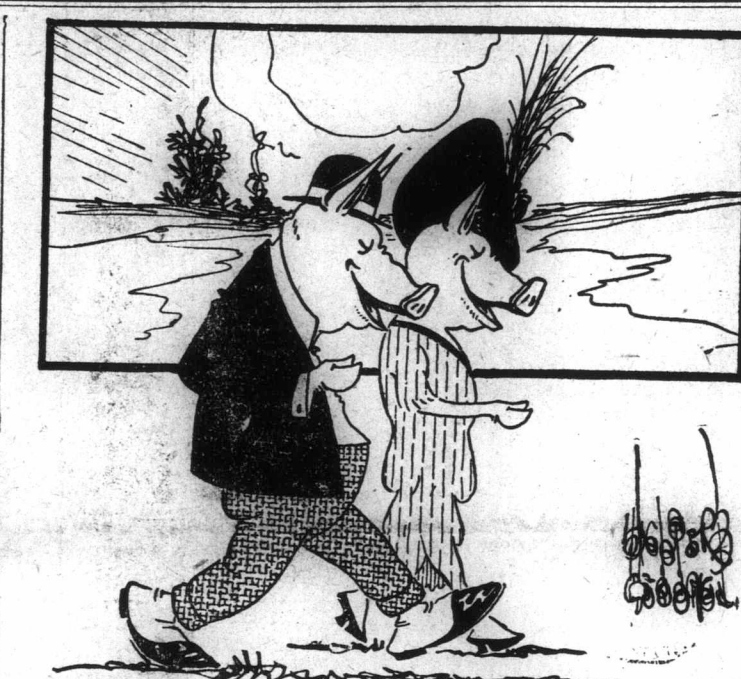
