[By Special Wire to the Courier] NEW YORK, Oct. I—A London cable to the Tribune says:
Lord Roberts who was 82 years old yesterday, in an article published to-day, urges his countrymen not to under estimate the power of Germany with its 66,-000,000 people.
"I canot zhelp thinking," he said, "that the great task of subduing that nation will begin when we, with our French, Russian and Bolgian allies, have driven the Grman allies into the heart of their own territory.

"May I give a word of caution to my countrymen against the unsportsman-like practice of obusing one's enemies? Let us avoid what Kipling, during the Boer war, described as "killing Kruger with our mouth."
