

# FLOUR IS SEIZED

From American Ships by British Cruisers.

ENGLAND CHARTERS CUNARD STEAMEST.

French Canadians Come in for Strong Criticism.

Some Idea of the big Commissariat Maintained by England in South Africa—Thousands of Tons of Provisions Sent to Feed the Army.

New York, Dec. 31. — England's policy concerning the Transvaal war was announced in Glasgow last night by Gerald Balfour, secretary of state for Ireland, who said: "The British government and people will not move a hair's breadth from their resolve to carry the war to a successful conclusion. No reverse can possibly alter the end of the war, for Britain has power and resources to effect her settled purpose."

### UMBRIA CHARTERED.

Liverpool, Dec. 31. — The Cunard steamer Umbria has been chartered by the British government as a transport.

### MISREPRESENTATIONS.

Quebec, Dec. 31. — The Chronicle, the English conservative organ here, in an article this morning warns the government, the French-Canadian Conservative organ, and other organs of the same party against what it terms the unfair, unpatriotic and highly unpolitic course which they are pursuing in deliberately misrepresenting Great Britain in connection with the South African trouble. The Chronicle declares it is ready to oppose any political party which adopts these tactics to gain advantage over political opponents.

### SEIZED AMERICAN FLOUR.

Washington, Dec. 31. — In the absence of formal complaint the state department officials do not care to express a specific opinion in the case of the reported seizures of American flour by British cruisers off the South African coast. Under the general rule adopted by our government, however, and adhered to by most other civilized governments, merchandise of this description sent by one neutral nation to another, as in the case of the United States and Portugal, is absolutely exempt from seizure.

### BIG FIGURES.

London, Dec. 31. — Some idea of the proportions of the British commissariat in South Africa may be gained from learning that no less than 400,000 lbs. of salt is one of the items going to the front. Twelve million pounds of preserved meat and the same amount of biscuit, with 400,000 pounds of coffee and 200,000 pounds of tea; 2,200,000 pounds of sugar, 800,000 pounds of compressed vegetables, 1,450,000 pounds of jam, and 360,000 tins of condensed milk are some of the staples upon which Thomas Atkins will sustain his strength.

### Another Concert.

Next Sunday night will witness the second in the series of sacred concerts to be given at the Palace Grand opera house. The concert will be under the auspices of the Philharmonic Society, of which C. M. Pring is the manager and Carl Lueders director. The splendid string orchestra which performed so satisfactorily on the occasion of the last concert will render a still more elaborate program next Sunday. The orchestra numbers 20 pieces and equals any similar organization to be heard in the Coast cities outside.

### New Light System.

Public improvements in Dawson continue to come, and when they do arrive are highly appreciated. Recently the

Yukon council let a contract to the Dawson Electric Light Company for installing 70 32 candle power incandescent lights to be placed according to plans furnished by City Engineer Kane.

Manager Donald Olson began the task with the vim and energy characteristic of that gentleman. Following the plans for lighting, he has had a crew of men wiring the district, putting up arms on the poles, preparing to fulfill the contract. This work has been considerably impeded on account of cold weather, the men not being able to "live on a pole" when the weather is so severe, several having had frozen fingers, one quite bad. Nevertheless, Mr. Olson has been able to put in 36 lights, which have been placed in the most advantageous parts of the town. From the Klondike bridge to St. Mary's hospital, and from the A. C. Co. to the foot of the hill, the belated pedestrian may now see his way home. In a few more days he hopes to have the full quota of lights installed and on any street much traveled will be found light enough for the most citified citizen in town.

Mr. Olson has certainly obtained the best of lights, the Thomson-Houston Co.'s latest make, and in showing the Nugget man over the lighted district they proved to be well adapted to the purpose.

To those who live on Chechahko hill the sight at night time is a pretty one, and we are pleased to note that much attention and praise has been bestowed on the light in all parts of the city.
