**HIGH SCHOOL INSPECTOR'S REPORT.**  
 On May 10th and 20th John Seath, B. A., High School Inspector, visited Athens High School. As the government grant of money to the H. S. is based on accommodations, equipment, and attendance, it will be of interest to our readers to know in what state the inspector found these particulars. The grading ranges from I, the highest to IV, the lowest. As to accommodations—everything is satisfactory, being marked from I to II, except heating, which is marked IV. Class rooms are marked II, on condition that the chemistry room is properly arranged for the large increase of pupils preparing for second class examinations. (Twenty-one pupils lack chemistry).  
 The equipment, so far as library, apparatus, charts, maps and globes are concerned, gets a fair grading—I to IV. The Inspector, however, thinks that it is a grave mistake that there are no appliances for physical education, and he strongly advises that provision be made for physical education as such provision is necessary and it would add a yearly income to the Board of \$140.  
 As to attendance—all the pupils have been duly admitted. The great increase in attendance is most encouraging. One hundred and thirty-one pupils (181) are now in attendance. Mr. Seath says "It is quite clear from the present attendance and the prospects for next half year, that to maintain the efficiency of the school, a fourth master should become a permanent addition to the staff. I press this upon the attention of the Board."  
 Discipline is marked I, and the state of the school registers is satisfactory. Mr. Seath concludes his report thus: "The progress of this school since my last visit has been marked and reflects credit upon the liberality of the Board and the ability of the staff, especially of the Head Master. When the improvements I have detailed above have been completed, it will be among the very best of the four master schools of the Province."  
**THE ACKLAND ESTATE.**  
 We acknowledge with thanks the receipt of \$270 from the Assignee in the matter of the estate of James H. Ackland, in settlement of our just and undoubted claim for \$18.48.
