ATHENS VILLAGE COUNCIL.

The municipal council met for the village of Athens met in the council room at 11 a.m. for organization. The following were present and, after making the usual qualification and declaration of office before B. Loverin, village clerk, took their seats at the council board for 1900, viz.: Geo. E. Judson, undertaker, reeve, and Geo. F. Donnelly, printer, John A. Bappell, grocer, Chas. E. Pickell, blacksmith, and Wm T. Earl, grocer, councillors.

On motion, the reeve and clerk were appointed a committee to wait on the council of Rear Yonge and Essett in session that day and discuss with them the proposal to secure the removal of the toll gates on the Farmersville Plank Road.

The council then adjourned to meet at 7.30 in the evening.

Council resumed at 7.30: All present.

A by-law to appoint certain village officers, define their duties and fix the remuneration for their services, was introduced, read three times, and passed, the blanks being filled in as follows: B. Loverin, clerk, salary, \$45; Jas. P. Lamb, treasurer, salary, \$20; Sheldon Y. Bullis, and Jas. H. Ackland, auditors, \$4.00 each; H. C. Phillips, chief police, sanitary inspector, &c., salary, \$35.00; Wm A. Lewis, high school trustee; Irwin Wiltse, member of local board of health.

On motion, an order for \$2.75 was made on treasurer in favor of Lindsay Trickey, for stenographic work on voters' list for 1899.

On motion, J. P. Lamb & Son's hall was engaged for all village purposes for 1900 at a rental of \$100.

On motion, an order was drawn on treasurer for \$1.00 to pay subscription to Municipal World, for use of council.

On motion, the taxes of J. H. Mills and Geo. F. Blackwell were remitted as their incomes in Athens for 1899 did not exceed the amount exempted by statute.

On motion, the collector's roll for 1899 was accepted as returned and the amount of uncollected taxes ordered to be paid into the treasurer, as follows: Mrs. James Finley, \$1.42; E. Gilroy (Baptist), \$1.44; John Mulvany, \$17.06; Geo. Patterson, \$9.94; Lester and John Jones, \$1.63; John Ross, \$2.20.

NEWBORO

MONDAY, Jan. 8.—Our public school opened on Wednesday, 3rd, with a full staff of teachers.

The 49th anniversary of the Methodist church, which took the form of a "C" supper, was held in the basement of the church, on the evening of Jan. 1st. During the fore part of the evening a sumptuous repast was served by the ladies of the congregation, after which a literary and musical treat was given by local talent in the auditorium above. One of the pleasant features of the evening was a presentation to the Organist and leader of the choir, fitting tokens of their appreciation. Over \$100 was realized.

The first hockey contest of the season, which was advertised to have been fought on the rink in our village between the Newboro and Westport senior teams, was a complete disappointment to the large crowd which assembled to witness the contest. When our invincible seven stripped for action and, good-naturedly, took up a position on the centre of the rink, the visiting seven as they leaned against the fence (from without) and gazed upon the familiar forms, which so easily vanquished them last year, one was heard to remark, "Introduce your scheme, pard." Whereupon one of the party advanced to the captain of the Newboro team and broke the news to him that one of their best men had a Belladonna plaster attached to his spinal column, which materially interfered with the working of the muscles of his back, and all attempts to remove it had failed. The captain therefore gave the decision in favor of Newboro by default of Westport. THE LATEST WAR NEWS

Dispatches received up to 3 p.m. today from the Reporter per G. N. W.

London, Jan. 9.—Reports from Ladysmith say that the Boers at all points after desperate fighting. Some on the western hill were captured three times by the Boers, and at the point of the bayonet by the British. The British have again and again by fresh swarms of volunteers, and it was brought by a fine bayonet charge of the Devonshire Regiment. The Boers greatly exceed those of the British, details of which were reserved for a subsequent report.

London, Jan. 10.—There was a singular dearth of news this morning from all parts of the theatre of war. Gen. Buller supplements his advice of yesterday by reporting that Capt. Ricardo and four troopers of the Life Guards are missing, showing that his reconnoitering party met with opposition. Gen. Gatacre despatched a strong force on Monday, Jan. 8, to reconnoitre Stormberg, which the Boers were reported to have evacuated. The British found the Burghers strongly entrenched and returned to Stormberg. Otherwise there was no fresh news. The Scottish Union of Glasgow was trying to block the sailing of the transport City of Rome by demanding an increase of wages.
