GONE TO HIS REST

Demise of David Wanless at the General Hospital This Morning.

Deceased was an Esteemed Member of the Community and will be Buried with Masonic Honors.

This morning there passed away, at the Public General Hospital, David Wanless, for many years an esteemed citizen of Chatham, at the age of 65 years.

Mr. Wanless has been in failing health for some time, but his condition was not considered alarming until last Sunday morning when he was overcome by a fainting spell while in his accustomed pew at the First Presbyterian Church. He was removed to the hospital on Monday, and his strength rapidly failed until the end came.

The deceased was born in Dundee, Scotland, in 1835, and came to this country with his parents when a lad of seven years. They settled in Varna, in the county of Huron, and, on reaching manhood, Mr. Wanless took control of the saw and grist mill there, which he managed successfully for some time. He then accepted the management of the Excelsior woolen mills and conducted them until his removal to Chatham about fourteen years ago, when he entered the employ of the T. H. Taylor Co., with whom he has been identified ever since.

Mr. Wanless was a Liberal in politics and a consistent member and staunch supporter of the Presbyterian Church. He was highly esteemed by the entire community.

The deceased leaves two sons, James, John and Mrs. Gilchrist, of Duluth, and Miss Aggie, of Buffalo. The funeral will be held with Masonic honors from the Masonic Hall, Fifth St., at 2.30 on Friday afternoon.

Euterpe Presides at Delightful Complimentary Function Presented to Patrons by Mrs. John Cooper and Pupils.

CHATS AGAIN

Pertinent Jottings Picked Up by The Planet in the City Engineer's Office.

A long required and much needed crossing has been built at the corner of Duke and Colborne streets.

Through the delicate construction of the nasal organ of a lady another offensive sewer outlet has been discovered and a catch basin is being put in the same.

It was suggested last evening by a member of the sports committee that prizes to the amount of \$100, divided into five parts, be given for the best illuminated and dressed window on King street on the night of July 1st.

The Board of Works staff of workmen are engaged extending the entrance of the Adelaide street sewer into the river. It is the intention to continue this work until the unsightly sewer outlets, pointing into the river and exposed to the public gaze, are covered and placed in a sanitary condition.

"Mayor Sulman, J. M. Pike, J. A. Thompson, Tom Watt and myself went out last evening and called on all the hotels and restaurants on King street," said the city engineer this morning. "We were not out for a time but were collecting for the 1st of July celebration. The men all came up liberally and we collected \$25 in short order. The Celebration committee meet to-morrow night to appoint a Finance committee."

MET WITH GHASTLY END

Michigan Central Brakeman Mangled on the Line Last Evening.

Inquest in Progress at Charing Cross—How He Came to His Death Yet a Mystery.

A ghastly find confronted Detective James R. McGregor this morning when he arrived upon the scene to investigate the death of G. F. Beavely, an M. C. R. brakeman, on the road near Charing Cross.

One and a half miles west of the little depot the trunk of the body of the dead man was found lying in the ditch. It was a shocking sight, horribly mutilated. Proceeding fully half a mile further down the track the deputy humane officer discovered the head and an arm of the deceased. The body was gathered gently together and taken to Charing Cross for inquest thereupon.

How the brakeman met his death is a mystery. When the M. C. R. train pulled into Fargo last evening at 11 o'clock he was missing. The conductor at once went back over the line with caboose and engine and the body was found west of Charing Cross. The authorities were notified immediately.

Detective McGregor arrived on the scene at 6.30 this morning and had the remains removed.

Dr. R. V. Bray, the railroad physician, was summoned by the company and Coroner Dr. Hanks placed in charge of the inquest. Undertaker Carr, of St. Thomas, is in charge of the remains, which will be removed to the dead man's late home in Oakville.

The inquest opened this morning and adjourned to meet again at Charing Cross on Friday evening.

A large delivery of electric light supplies have arrived and are on exhibition on the building owned by Geo. Vester, Jr., next to Chas. Sheldon's livery.

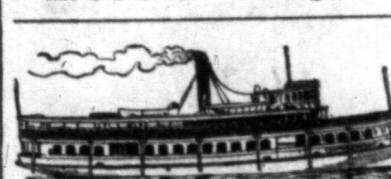
