### PLEASED CONGREGATION OF LATTER DAY SAINTS

Elder R. C. Russell in the Saints

Church last night spoke on "The Unpardonable Sin," using as the basis of his remarks Matt. 12, 32, the speaker took up the criminal code of laws of Canada and produced many proofs from the Bible to show that all those evils which the moral law of our country prohibited were also prohibited in scriptural times, but nevertheless, as in the case now, so was it then, those people who had never obeyed Christ's doctrine, but were keeping the laws of man, made churches, were continually committing those evils. Not only did those outside of Christ's church break the moral law, but some of those who had been baptized in water but not yet born of the Holy Spirit, engaged in like crimes. Those who had not been baptized committed from the least to the greatest possible crime, who had the marks of Christ, Acts 7, 51-52, and then they killed Stephen, who accused them of slaying the Messiah. But even those people when they were convinced of their crime and sought forgiveness were freely pardoned by being baptized in water for the remission of all past sins, Acts 2, 21-42. Even Saul of Tarsus was an abettor to the murder of Stephen, but afterwards he obeyed the doctrine of Christ and by baptism had his sins washed away. Acts 22, 16, and later on was one of Christ's greatest Apostles, known by name of Paul.

The great Apostle Peter cursed and swore that he did not know Christ, and was thus guilty of lying, cursing, swearing and denying Christ, Matt. 26, 67-75.

None thus far mentioned, said the speaker, has yet received the Holy Ghost, and can therefore not sin against it, but on and after the day of Pentecost those who did receive it remained firm enough in the faith not to deny God, Christ, and the Holy Ghost. For had they thus denied openly and maliciously the Trinity and their power when the Holy Spirit had taken up its abode within them Paul says they have sinned against the Holy Ghost, Heb. 6, 4-6. However, there is not one instance in the New Testament of any person sinning against the Holy Spirit.

### AN INTERESTING CASE OVER AN OIL WELL

A rather interesting case, in which

F. W. Smith, Esq., acting for the plaintiff, was successful, has been finally disposed of by the Divisional Court in Toronto. It was an action by the plaintiffs, by way of a mechanic's lien against the defendants, to recover twelve hundred dollars for drilling an oil well in the Tully fields, all the parties being residents of the United States. The defendants made an application to His Honor Judge Bell for security for costs, which application was dismissed by the Judge, and the defendants appealed from Judge Bell's order to a Judge in Chambers in Toronto, and this appeal was also dismissed with costs. The defendants further appealed to the Divisional Court, and again they were unsuccessful and were compelled to pay the costs.

### CLEMENTS HAS AN EYE ON THE EXPENDITURES

The other day, while the House of Commons was in committee on supply, H. S. Clements, M. P. for West Kent, drew attention to an item which shows forth, in one of the smaller respects, the extravagance of the Dominion Government.

An item for \$22,000 for improvements to the Collingwood Harbor was presented for discussion. The official report of the incident is as follows: "Mr. Clements. I notice that Boone & Co. are doing the dredging at Rondeau Harbor for 131-4 cents per yard, whereas at Collingwood harbor they get 30 cents per yard. We have several dredges in the vicinity of Rondeau harbor and possibly the competition may account for the price we are paying there. The difference between 131-4 and 30 cents, is an absolute waste of public money.

"Mr. Fisher. It is a different matter altogether.  
"Mr. Clements. We have good solid clay at Rondeau, and the inference is that we are getting the work done there at proper price." Again, in reference to an estimate of \$75,000 for Harbor Improvements at Port Stanley, he showed that in comparison with the Rondeau work, the price was high. He suggested that the minister should take into consideration the contracts given at Port Stanley and at Rondeau. They are only a few miles apart, it is precisely the same lake bed, the soil is the same, there appears to be a great difference between these contract prices, and he thought the matter was worth looking into.
