MORE DISCREPANCIES.

The Public Works Department appeared in a rather bad light, in a small matter before the Public Accounts Committee on Thursday of last week. E. J. Rainboth, C. E., district engineer on the Georgian Bay survey, refused to certify to certain charges made by a grocer from whom the Department bought ho. ses, sleighs, robes and other outfit. The trader appears to have been another of those go-betweens or commission purchasers. The engineer reported that the horses were not worth the price charged. Rainboth swears that a sleigh charged at \$75 could have been bought from a manufacturer at \$40, and that robes not worth more than \$4 or \$5, were charged at \$18. It is fair to say that some of these accounts are not yet settled. The engineer made the further startling statement that while he was objecting to the prices two goods arrived at his residence with a coalskin coat from the dealer and an invoice of the same at \$100 less five discounts of forty per cent., 25 per cent, 15 per cent., 15 per cent again and 3 per cent. Mr. Rainboth sent the coat back with a message that it had come to the wrong man, and went immediately to the Deputy Minister to tell him of the attempt to buy him off. He described the transaction as an "outrageous robbery." It may be remarked that Mr. Rainboth has retired from the public service, which explains how he ventures to tell his experience.

### ENCOURAGING IRREVERENCE.

There is much irreverence in the present age, one of the things which is to be deplored amongst so many that are to be approved and rejoiced over, comments the Stratford Herald. Reference is not made to that spirit abroad which tries the foundation of all things. If the foundations are secure their trial will ultimately result in good. Apart from this there are many who believe the Christian religion in theory, at least, who show at times much irreverence for sacred things. Frequently people who would listen to sermons or take part in church services are disturbed by irreverent young people who chatter through the sermon and do not stop even during the prayers. A church seems to them no better than a playhouse. They are not all thoughtless youths that do this, and where they are, if they were taught a proper respect for an edifice regarded as sacred, they would not do it.

One practice which encourages this spirit of irreverence is that in many churches entertainments are held in which secular songs and comic recitations are introduced. Applause follows the performance, and young people who are present cannot be expected to have respect on Sunday for a building which is so used on a week night. The Catholic and the Anglican churches set a good example in this respect by allowing nothing which is not of a sacred character to be given within the walls of the building dedicated to worship, and when a sacred concert is given no applause is allowed. This is as it should be. If the other churches will follow this example it will do something to inculcate the proper feeling of reverence for houses of worship—not of awe—that old idea has been very properly exploded.

The clause in the new Lord's Day bill providing that every domestic servant who is employed on Sunday shall have a day off during the week has been mildly characterized as "extraordinary." Extraordinary undoubtedly it is and unique it is to be hoped it will remain. What right has a legislature to meddle with purely private agreements and purely domestic affairs? Domestic servants in this country are not slaves; they can and do, make their own agreements with their employers on this as on other subjects. The practical result if such meddling were to become law, would probably be the universal employment of Chinese, who could plead conscience against keeping any Lord's Day at all—Goldwin Smith.

CHILD'S DRESS.

White materials are more often chosen in making dresses for the little ones than colored fabrics, and as illustrated, nainsook was used and trimmed with lace edging and fine embroidery. The square neck, with short puff sleeves and capulet would be chosen for afternoon wear and for a plainer development a higher neck and long sleeves are provided. If the French effect is desired, straps of the material or insertion are sewed on to the perforations through which the sash is drawn and held in place. The sash is not provided for in the pattern. Fine lawn, nainsook, swiss, albatross and challis in white, plain or delicately figured, goods are recommended; and for the trims, tulle, over, tucked lawn, mousseline, with trimmings of Valenciennes lace.

The quantity of material required for size 4 is 2 3/4 yards of 32 inch goods, 3 1/2 yards of insertion and 5 yards of edging. Pattern No. 4115 is out in sizes 1 to 8 years.

Full length sleeves may show a plain cuff or may be faced with the material used for the yoke. If the short sleeves are used a narrow band confines the fullness at the elbow. The three-piece circular skirt is closed at the back. Embroidered and printed cotton voiles, chambray, lawn, organdie soft silks, eolienne, dotted swiss in combination with Danish, hedebo and eyelot embroidery, Cluny and Torsion laces are suggested. ## TOWNSHIP COUNCILS

### DOVER COUNCIL.

The Council met, May 29. The members were all present. The minutes of the last meeting were read and adopted.

A by-law was read to form a new school section.

A by-law was read and finally passed detaching the north lot 9 in the 10th concession from S. S. No. 9 and adding to S. S. No. 14.

A petition from Alfred Barnier and others was read, asking for a bridge near dredge cut on Dover East and West townships.

Moved by Messrs. Lewis and Terry that the grievance of J. Bagnell be referred to the Reeve and Mr. Bourdeau with power.—Carried.

Moved by Lewis and Crawford, that the Reeve order No. 2 pressed down wheel secured from Sawyer & Massey Co., at the price agreed on.—Carried.

The by-law to form a new school section from parts of S. S. Nos. 1, 5, 7, and 9, was laid over for further consideration.

The grievance of Charles Mayers was referred to Mr. Lewis with power.

Moved by Bourdeau and Terry, that Mr. Lewis be appointed commissioner on the work of improving the Hind Drain Outlet.—Carried.

Moved by Lewis and Bourdeau that the Plan account, \$8.72, be paid for advertising sale of dredge work in Hind Drain Outlet.—Carried.

The Council adjourned and met June 4th, as a Court of Revision on the Township Assessment Rolls, and for general business.

The members were all present. Moved by Crawford and Lewis, that having considered the appeals on the assessment roll for 1906, and heard the appellants in attendance, in evidence, the following changes be made viz., \$300 be taken off the north lot 16, B. D. E. in the 8th con.; James E. Dillon and William Dillon be assessed as joint owners with James Dillon of all lands in Dover assessed to James Dillon, that the rest of the appeals be dismissed and the Court of revision closed.—Carried.

The Council met. The minutes of last meeting were read and adopted. The following were read:

From H. Gillet, notice that the north branch of the Hendrick drain requires to be repaired. Sam Holmes per his solicitor, wants a tile drain across 12th concession road at his property near Mitchell's Bay. James Dillon, notice per his solicitor, of sale under mortgage, of certain property, Houston & Stone, affidavit of disbursements of appellant re Harvard Tap Drain Repair. Lewis & Richards re W. H. Chapple, wanting a temporary bridge while Boyle drain is being dredged. J. G. Kerr, copies of agreement re free ferry, asking to have them executed on behalf of Dover.

The Dunlop Drain by-law was read and finally passed.

The Clerk was instructed to notify Alex. Lucier, commissioner, to go on at once with the work of repairing and improving the Bachand Drain.

The tax grievance of John Garnie was referred to the Reeve and Clerk.

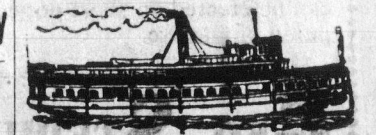
