There is no further news from Lord Kitchener, who, according to a Cape Town despatch, is calling for five thousand men to guard the Rand mines. Enlisting in Cape Colony contines active and five hundred men will leave Capetown for the north within the next few days.

Information regarding the invasion is scanty. Col. Williams attacked the eastern invaders Jan. 1, near Middelburg, but failed to dislodge them. He has since been joined by Lieut. Col. Grenfell, and the Boers have retired.

Only a few weeks ago two young men were arrested in Fredericton, one for entering two stores, the other for entering one. They admitted their guilt, just the same as the parties tried in Woodstock, and were sent to the county jail, one for eight and the other for six months. These two poor unfortunates, Hickey and Bolanger, through their ignorance in consenting to be tried by a man whose judgment is meither tempered by justice or equity, have to serve one of the most unjust punishments for a trivial offence compared—with the two who were only sent to gaol in Fredericton. Both these men have wives and small children and I think there should be some way to get these men a fair and impartial trial, and that they should be accorded some measure of British fair play for the two poor unfortunate men above named.
