## Appeal For Early Naval Conference Among Dominions

**Naval Expert Declares Burden of \$250,000,000 Upon British Taxpayer for Upkeep of Imperial Navy Growing Too Heavy—Affirms Empire Defence Must be Considered From Standpoint of Whole Empire.**

London, Oct. 20.—The "Quarterly Review" publishes an authoritative 15 page appeal for the earliest possible Naval Conference, preferably at Vancouver, as a half-way house, for the discussion among the partners of the Empire of the grave new situation, threatening the security of every British State and the conditions of Empire partnership.

The writer, Mr. Archibald Hurd, explains the confusion which the Canadian-Senate's action has introduced into the relations between the Imperial Government and the governments of the dominions generally.

The British taxpayer next year is paying \$250,000,000 for an Empire Navy, but the present situation of British construction, which keeps in view practically only one naval power, Germany, is already proving unequal to naval expansion in the Mediterranean, where Germany is allied with Italy and Austria, and to the new situation on the Pacific, where the balance of power is turning against us.

The British flag, he says, has been withdrawn from the outer seas under compelling circumstances. He proceeded:

"It is incompatible with the dignity of England to recall Nelson's famous phrase that hardly a single large armed ship was ever seen on the Pacific or Atlantic where the great fleets of Japan and the United States now rather strength monthly by month."

"Every liberty, every privilege cherished by all the British peoples depends upon these peoples' reply to the

renewed challenge now offered to British supremacy.

Must Consider Empire Defence From New Angle.

"Unless the British peoples are content to abandon their maritime heritage, upon which rests British power, finance and the exercise of diplomatic pressure, which are as vital to Canada and the other dominions, relatively speaking, as to the United Kingdom, then the adequacy of the Empire's defence must be jointly reconsidered from the standpoint of the whole Empire."

The Admiralty can obtain as many officers and men in the United Kingdom as parliament votes, and ships in practically any number can be built if the authority is obtained. The difficulty is the financial burden, which is becoming too heavy to be borne by the British taxpayer unaided.

Including the Crown colonies, the overseas portion of the Empire have a revenue equal to ours, and their white population is about one-third that of the Motherland. Yet they bear almost a negligible share of the burden.

"The position is anomalous and unfair to the British taxpayer, particularly to the millions living on the borderland of poverty."

It is also humiliating to the young nations overseas and to India. A conference should be called at the earliest opportunity to deal with these new and insistent problems, particularly the fresh naval situation rapidly developing."

## "PRISON IS HELL" SAYS HAWTHORNE

Writer, Released from Atlanta Penitentiary, Says Warden Moyer is "Unfit."

Atlanta, Ga., Oct. 20.—Characterizing the Atlanta federal penitentiary as a "living hell," and declaring that Warden Moyer was "unfit" for his position, Julian Hawthorne, novelist and writer, released from the prison this morning, took the eleven o'clock train for New York. He was accompanied by Dr. W. J. Morton, who has been his fellow prisoner since the two were convicted, nearly a year ago, for using the mails for fraudulent purposes. Mr. Hawthorne was accompanied by Dr. Morton, who said:

"Prisoners are subjected to treatment that is nothing but slow murder. There is never enough to eat. The warden attempts to feed strong men on nine cents a day and when he succeeds he brags about it."

Mr. Hawthorne described what is known as the "hole." This, he said, is a dungeon underneath the prison, used as a place of solitary confinement. For the slightest fault he said, sometimes for breaking a plate or even less, a prisoner is sent to this "hole," where the heat is terrific and the stench almost nauseating. He declared that some prisoners are chained by the wrists and held thus with arms stretched upward for hours.

The novelist declared that he had nothing to complain of so far as his own treatment was concerned. He said he and Dr. Morton had pleasant work and were well treated otherwise. He declared that it was the system that he intended to expose.

"There has never a man gone into the prison without undergoing steady deterioration," said Mr. Hawthorne. "It may be slow, but it is always sure. The most miserable feature of this place is that it is a model. There are always clean grounds to exhibit and baseball games to talk of and music at the meals. But nothing is said about the 'hole,' no one ever sees that."

"Did you ever hear of the riot the prisoners started over their feeding? The public heard that it was over in a few minutes, but it wasn't. It had been brewing for months. The men were absolutely starved."

Mr. Hawthorne said he intended to attack the system and see whether some remedy could be found. He expects to engage in newspaper and literary work.

## BISHOP REACHES BOSTON.

Prelate of Baker City, Ore., First of Four-score Prelates to Reach Boston.

(Boston Globe.)

Bishop Charles J. O'Reilly of the diocese of Baker City, Ore., arrived in Boston yesterday afternoon, the first to reach this city of the four-score prelates expected by Saturday night. Bishop O'Reilly will be the guest of Rev. James N. Supple at the rectory of St. Francis de Sales' Church, Charlestown.

Bishop O'Reilly is in charge of the largest see in the United States in area, which is also admitted to be the poorest diocese in the country. He was appointed bishop in August, 1903, and then had only six priests to cover a territory of 66,000 square miles, about twice as large as Ireland. To-day he has 30 priests and 37 churches or chapels widely scattered. There are about 6,000 Catholic people in the region, 700 of whom are Indians.

Bishop O'Reilly said: "The people there travel a long way to attend mass, for, you know, it is the only diocese in the United States that has not a mile of street railway tracks. The priests and the people make their distances on horse back. It is for dioceses like Baker City that the Catholic Church Extension Society is doing marvelous work and I hope that God will bless Rev. Dr. Kelley, its president, through whose efforts in this grand work the seed of Catholicism is being planted in the desolate spots of the West."

## GOVERNMENT AID TO AGRICULTURE

Hon. Mr. Burrell Extending Scope of Activity—Special Normal School Courses.

Ottawa, Oct. 20.—The interests of the farmers are being carefully cherished by the Hon. Government and the Hon. Martin Burrell as Minister of Agriculture is carrying out his plan of extending the scope of the Agricultural Department. The spending of the grant made during last session is receiving the attention of the heads of the department and announcement is made of the work.

Several small demonstration plants in different parts of the provinces will be constructed as an aid to poultry-rearers. Demonstration fruit orchards will also be established. The same methods will apply to dairying, tobacco growing, the maple syrup industry and house production.

The minister, in his new agricultural policy of introducing better methods, will follow the lines already laid, while assisting the farmer to produce better fruit and more honey, tobacco, etc. Reports are being received from farmers all over the country, who are adopting the principles of the department.

In connection with the third part of the new agricultural policy, namely to teach the rudiments in the public schools, the department announces special courses for normal school teachers in nature training. It is proposed to establish agricultural branches in connection with French-speaking normal schools, and it is also proposed to enlarge the scope of domestic science schools by adding to them work in agriculture, dairying, etc. All sections of the Dominion are receiving a fair share and the desire of the present government to assist the farmer by the introduction of modern methods will lay the foundation of future prosperity.

## TO COMMEMORATE A GREAT BATTLE

Thousands Attend the Ceremony at Leipsic Today from All Over Europe.

Leipsic, Saxony, Oct. 20.—A stirring note of patriotism was sounded here today, when thousands of people from all parts of Germany, Austria, Russia and Sweden, and many foreign countries, gathered for the dedication of the memorial of the battle of the Nations, which ended just 100 years ago in a victory for the allies over the French, and resulted in the emancipation of Germany.

One of the most striking features of the day's exercise was the arrival of the last runners in a series of relays, bearing banners and greetings from every quarter of the German Empire, and also from Washington and from Brazil, which they presented to the King of Saxony, who dedicated the monument.

The banner from the United States passed through the hands of many thousands of athletes before it reached those of His Majesty, and altogether in all the relays, no fewer than 42,000 runners were engaged.

## TON OF BRICKS FAIL TO KILL

Portland, Me., Oct. 20.—Herman Keith joined the Chestnut Street Methodist church three weeks ago. Today as he stood in front of the church building reading the announcement of services, more than a ton of bricks fell from the top of the tower and he was buried.

Passersby dug him out and saved for a few minor cuts and bruises he was uninjured.

## PARCEL POST AND LOWER CABLES

Present Postmaster General Has Already Accomplished Much.

Ottawa, Oct. 20.—During the recent visit of Rt. Hon. Herbert Samuel, the British Postmaster-General, to Ottawa, Hon. L. P. Pelletier took the opportunity to bring about a lengthy conference on the subject of cable rates and parcel post.

This is one of many indications of the deep and practical interest which is being taken by the Canadian Postmaster-General in these two important questions.

In bringing about reduced cable rates between Canada and the mother country, Mr. Pelletier has already accomplished much, far more than any of his predecessors ever did. But he is not yet satisfied and will not rest until the people of Canada are enjoying the benefits of the lowest possible charges between Canada and Great Britain.

As to the parcel post Mr. Pelletier has also advanced far beyond the limits attained by the various Liberal postmaster-generals. Most of the latter left the question alone altogether. It was too big for them. Hon. Rodolph Lemieux talked a lot about it, did nothing, and showed a strong disposition to block the efforts of Hon. Mr. Pelletier in the inauguration of a parcel post system.

Mr. Pelletier has studied the operation of the system there. He will have a parcel post system in operation in Canada early in the new year and will make a success of it.
