ONLY WOMEN LEFT.

Buda Pest, July 26.—The lure of America as a land of wealth to the people of Hungary has brought about a curious state of affairs in Kerisova, near Lugos, which at the last census had a population of 3,500.

One by one the male residents of Kerisova emigrated until the mayor was the only adult male to remain. Finally he also took ship at Fiume.

As a result of this exodus of males the women of Kerisova have just elected a young woman to the position of mayor, and other female residents have been elected to fill the remainder of the municipal offices.
