SATURATED BY CORRUPTION.

Such is the Civic Adminstration of Montreal 25 Per Cent. Spent in Boodle and

the Rest in Doubtful Ways. Aldermen and Officials Found Guilty of Maladministration.

Montreal, Dec. 13 .- Mr. Justice Canon submitted his anxiously awaited report relative to the investigation into the civic affairs of Montreal to the Provincial Secretary, Hon. J. L. Decarie, this morning, after which the document was transmitted to the Attorney-General, who in turn handed it over to the Provincial Cabinet. The report is a scathing denunciation of the civic admin istration of Montreal since 1902. "It is an administration which in my own mind," says Judge Cannon, "is saturated with corruption due to the plague of

with corruption due to the plague of patronage."

He declares that of the annual revenue of five million dollars 25 per cent, was spent in wine drinking, commissions and other evil purposes, while the remainder was expended in public works, which had no permanence or stability.

The Judge condemns the representation of the city by wards in the City Council, and says that it was that which gave birth to patronage and opposing factions which, in their frenzied fight for control, lose sight of the best interests of the community. The enquiry shows, the Judge holds, that there was maladministration and fraud on the part of aldermen and others whom he condemned to pay costs, chiefly of their testimony as witnesses, and that of any witness heard in their favor.

"That the civic administration of Montreal since 1902 has been saturated by corruption, coming from the plague of patronage.
"The majority of the aldermen administered the affairs in a manner to favorthe particular interests of relatives and friends, to whom they distributed contracts and positions to the detriment of the city and taxpayers.

"As a result of maladministration the annual revenue of \$5,000,000 was spent as follows: Twenty-five per cent. in boodling and other evils. As to the balance, the greater part was employed in ance, the greater part was employed in-works of which the permanence was

ance, the greater part was employed inworks of which the permanence was questionable."

The report proceeds: "After the revelations made before me, the citizens on September 20, 1909, approved, by a crushing majority, the proposed reduction, of the number of aldermen and the establishment of a Board of Control as provided by article 9, Edward VII., chap. 82. My task was made easy, as I should have advocated the adoption of these radical reforms, which I believe to be of a nature to ameliorate the civic administration of Montreal.

With regard to the representation of the city by wards, all are in accord to condemn this system, which has given birth to patronage and its abuses. I recommend to the citizens of Montreal, after serious study, to adopt another system, to create a council composed of aldermen to represent the whole city and to work in unison to enlarge it and render it more prosperous.

"The council of to-day is composed of groups and factions, fighting among one another for control, so that they lose sight of the superior interests of the community.

"With regard to the criminal prosecution to which the city could order the council elected at the next term should adopt this line of conduct.
