CAMPAIGN IN AID OF ORPHAN'S HOME

Hon. W.F. Roberts, Hon. R. W. Wigmore, Hon. J.G. Forbes, L. P.D. Tilley, ex M.P.P., Ex-Mayor E.A. Schofield, Collector C.B. Lockhart, Dr. G.G. Corbett, Frank B. Ellis, Editor of the "Globe", Howard P. Robinson, manager of the New Brunswick Telephone Company, Dr. James Manning, Lt.-Col. McMillan, and more than forty prominent citizens of St. John are devoting time and energy to the campaign to provide for the Protestant Orphans of New Brunswick. Similar groups of leading citizens in Fredericton, Moncton, Chatham Sussex, Hampton and other centres have already been organized, and within a week it is hoped to have the whole Province lined up for the great co-operative drive to last five days from December 10th to 15th inclusive, to raise \$250,000 for the New Brunswick Protestant Orphans' Home.

In St. John a leader has been chosen for each of the city wards, and he will have a group of well known residents of the ward as helpers during the campaign. A central office has been opened, from which the whole campaign is conducted, and the cost is defrayed by a few generous people, so that every dollar subscribed throughout the Province will go to the Home.

Why has this Campaign been started, and why are busy business men giving time and energy and money to make it a success? Because at present there is only, in the whole Province of New Brunswick, outside of poorhouses, enough room in Protestant Orphans' Homes for 180 children. The Roman Catholics who comprise much less than half the total population have homes to accommodate about 2000. The three Protestant orphanages in St. John have accommodations for 158 children. There should be one large orphanage for the whole

Province, capable of enlargement as the need arises. This is provided for in the James Manchester farm near Fairville. There are thirty-five acres of land. The present farmhouse and barn can be utilized. Another building is now under construction. The plans provide for extension, but the home as now planned will double the capacity of the three existing Homes.

This is not a St. John, but a provincial institution. It has been, since 1920, and has cared for children from all parts of the Province to the limit of its capacity. The appeal of December 10th—15th will be made in behalf of the orphans. Surely they have a right to a fair start in life. If they do not get it, many of them will grow up to be a burden instead of producing factors in the community. It is good economy to care for them, but it is also a duty Christian men and women cannot evade with a clear conscience.

This campaign is a great province wide appeal to the Protestant people to make such provision for their orphans, as will enable the latter to become good men and women, and an asset rather than a liability to the Province at large. The great institution on the Manchester farm will be a source of pride to the whole Province and by bringing it under one administration in one group of buildings the per capita cost of maintenance will be substantially reduced.

The ministers of all Protestant churches are behind the movement but the significant thing about it is that it is a layman's movement having not only the approval but the hearty support of hard-headed business men. Every Protestant in the Province will feel a desire to share in this work for the helpless little children.

SEALS IN THE RIVER

In No Danger Of Total Extinction

W.O. McGeehan Says That the Miramichi Moose can Look After Themselves

"Every now and then somebody sounds the alarm about the wild life of the country being threatened with extinction. It seems to me that these alarms are largely unwarranted, especially after a trip to the Miramichi country on the trail of the lonesome moose," writes Major W.O. McGeehan, who recently visited New Brunswick in the Sunday New York Herald.

"The moose of the Miramichi is not scarce, if the signs are to be credited, but he is highly elusive. I have read that the high power rifles and the new methods of transportation have brought about conditions that make it seem probable that the moose will have disappeared within a decade or so.

"If you have been reading these things and are worrying about the coming extinction of the moose try and get one yourself. Of course, if you want to shoot one from call which is just as exciting as going into the barnyard and shooting a cow that never did any harm but furnish the milk for you to water, you can do it. But if you want to still hunt one of these innocent animals you will undertake a job that will convince you that there will be moose in the Miramichi for centuries after the last hunter has decided that his dogs are too tender for those trails.

"Once upon a time this writer used to feel murderously inclined toward the moose of the Miramichi. Their profiles annoyed him. Everything about the moose seemed to arouse his sleeping homicidal mania, but after dragging his moaning dogs through one hundred and fifty miles of comparatively primeval Miramichi country the writer is ready to lay any differences between himself and the moose people before the League of Nations. "The moose can be relied upon to conserve himself."

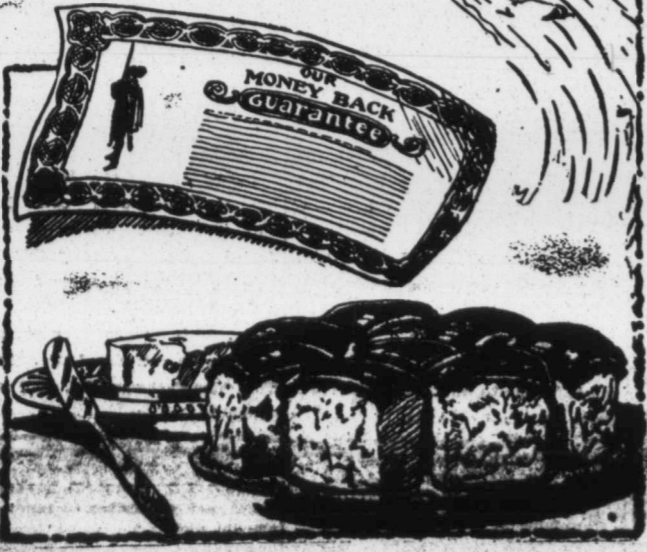
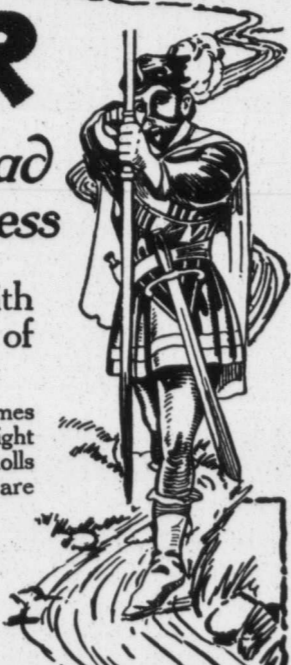
