A Silly Proposal

Reports at present current are not necessary to give a coloring of the statements that the dominant party intends tinkering with our School Act. During the recent campaign one of the men high in the councils of the government made such an intemperate speech, and another ridiculous one concerning the maintenance of papers, the chief plank of his platform. Besides his advocacy of the change, we have the Premier, whose editor is also a supporter of the government, openly discussing upon the matter, and advocating the abolition of the supplementary clause among his other hobbies on retirement. Present appearances seem to justify the assertion that it is part of the policy of our rulers to make an onslaught during the coming session upon the educational system of the Province. Possibly the majority have given birth to the opinion that they have received an everlasting mandate from the people, and are at perfect liberty to override as will their well understood wishes. The present school law gives the best of satisfaction; and we fear that tampering with it—especially along the lines proposed by certain members of the government—will not conduce to the advancement of education. If the government is really sincere in the carrying out of the cheery policy outlined by the Premier, great savings can be effected without undermining the branch of the public service. Reinforcement is undoubtedly in order for the good of the Province, and the sooner it is inaugurated the better. A start made within the precincts of the Provincial Building would not cause serious results to the country. The governmental offices are now overstocked with officials, yet no mention of curtailment is made in that quarter. Many of these offices were created to close the mouths of hungry supporters, and are altogether unnecessary. The assertion is no idle one. Facts amply uphold it. If retrenchment, begin in the proper quarter. Clip the official list, and pay less attention to the wants of private individuals. Interference with our schools will meet with determined opposition. An almost similar change to that now proposed proved abortive years ago, and so also, we imagine, will this.

A Question of Patronage

A CORRESPONDENT of the Examiner, writing over the non de plume of "Gladstone," discusses the question of patronage, as doled out by the local government. The question is one that has time and again engaged the attention of the thoughtful and fair-minded, not only with regard to the local, but also the Dominion government. Though the theme may be somewhat old, it is one which might often be referred to, with perhaps, better results. The disparity of patronage which "Gladstone's" figures reveal—and they by no means show the true state of affairs—may well prompt him to ask "Why is it that the Catholics of Prince Edward Island do not receive a fair share of the patronage at the disposal of the Local Government?" The way in which they are handicapped in this, as well as in all other quarters, intensifies the truth of the statement that they are the under dog in the fight. It is certainly a striking anomaly that one half our population—people who are as loyal and dutiful subjects, and as law-abiding citizens as any to be found in the land—should merit such treatment. No fair-minded person will for a moment assert that Catholics receive their just due in the matter of which "Gladstone" complains. To have the matter remedied should be the desire of every lover of his fair play. "Gladstone's" figures, incomplete as they are, forcibly show the justice of his contention. With but scant verbiage they would of themselves make an eloquent plea. While several important offices held by both Protestants and Catholics have been omitted from the list, their incorporation would not serve to equalize matters. Mr. Bell's agent visited the place and found that Ferris had disposed of the organ to another of whom Mr. Bell could find nothing about. Since then the same person has had many calls from persons calling from the same district, but he found through enquiry that they were of the same class. Mr. Bell has no hesitation in saying that the swindling is being carried on by one "gang" who dispose of their spoils to one Crandall who acts as an agent or receiver of spoils.

Probably the last and final trick

at swindling was practiced on the firm of O Flood & Son, on September 21st, when Samuel R. Barnett of Belleisle Creek, walked into their store and began an investigation of their piano finally selecting a \$300 article which he wanted, and agreed to pay for it on the installment plan. Mr. Flood, who attended the man, thought it strange that there was a demand for such costly articles from so remote a part of the country. The suspicion of the transaction was not at rest, however, when on the same day another man named Henderson of the same place called and incidentally or casually mentioned Barnett's name, saying he is good for any amount. The price of the piano was four months, making it fall due on Jan. 21st. On that day, as no word was received by the firm from Barnett, he was written to, but failed to reply. The piano was sent and sold to the man named Henderson, who had disposed of the piano to a third party and so the game went on.

Last week Mr. Flood & Son went

to Hampton where they avowed out a warrant for Barnett's arrest for theft. The warrant was placed in Sheriff Sprout's hands and Barnett lodged in jail where he awaits trial. The operations referred to above are not the only ones these schemers have engaged in. Mr. A. T. Duntin, another large piano dealer, reports the loss of a valuable instrument within the past year through the same swindle operation engaged in and to the same cliques or parties.
