Municipal Matters.

MR. LARACY WRITES.

Editor Evening Telegram:

Dear Sir:—In asking the ratepayers of the city to support my candidature on Monday next I do so with the belief that a better state of municipal government than at present exists can be maintained, and that better results can be got out of the taxes we are now obliged to pay.

During my visits to different portions of the city within the past few weeks I have heard general complaints on matters which have been brought to my notice, and particularly on the subject of the necessity for more lights in certain localities and for cleaner streets and surface drains within certain areas. I see no reason why both these questions cannot be satisfactorily adjusted without anything more than a more economic supervision of the amounts already spent in this direction.

The necessity of public play grounds is also evident to all. At present the children of the workingman, who have not the luxury of private grounds, cannot participate in healthful games within the city limits without being subject to the risk of being brought before the Magistrate. At very little cost three such playgrounds could be created in different sections of the city, and the good effects of such a policy would be soon perceived in the good health of our younger generation.

A revision of the present system of taxation is also absolutely necessary, so that the burden of the city's expenditure may be properly borne.

An extension of the water service so as to furnish a complete system of water pipes all over the city should be taken up at once, and in certain localities where the residents are at present obliged to carry water for the length of the street, prompt attention is particularly required.

My opinions on the subject of the extension of our sewerage have already been intimate, and my earnest desire, if elected, will be to bring the improvement into effect having particular regard to the financial position of our industrial classes.

These, Mr. Editor, are a few of the points on which I feel I can, if given the opportunity, do my fellow citizens some service and I only respectfully ask them to give me a trial.

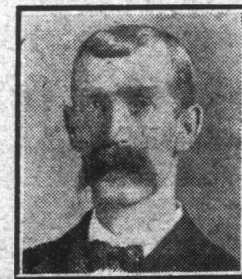

The fifth League Football Match took place at St. George's Field last evening between the B. I. S. and C. E. I. teams. Shortly after 7 the match began. The C. E. I. who had won the toss defending the western goal with a light westerly breeze in their favor. The game began by the C. E. I. making a run on the Irish territory, but English proved a hard man to pass, and sent the ball up the ground. Brophy brothers took control, and running west made a try for goal but failed to score. The Irish in green and gold now showed some nice combination play, pierced the back division of the C. E. I. and might have scored but that Down was ruled off side. The C. E. I. lads now "bucked up," called on Brophy who saved well and then play became fast generally. Later Kavanagh was on it and with a well directed kick scored. The Irish substitute had the best of the game for the rest of the half. Keeping the ball well down on the Irish goal, through a scrimmage opposite the Irish shot and landed the ball in the net. Shortly after the teams crossed the C. E. I. 1 goal; B. I. S. 1 goal. In the next half the teams worked hard to get a winning goal; good play resulted on both sides but bad shooting prevented scoring, and the game ended in a draw, the teams scoring a goal each. Mr. W. Rev. Mr. Matthews Passed Away.

We record with deep regret the death of Rev. Solomon Matthews, which occurred at Pouch Cove yesterday morning. Deceased, who had been ill all the summer, was born in Trowbridge in Wiltshire, England, sixty-eight years ago, and having studied for the Methodist ministry and been ordained, came to Greenspond, Nfld., in 1870, when he was in his 25th year. He there endeared himself to the people. He also labored subsequently at Grand Bank, Burin, Pelites, Old Perlican, Cupids, Bay Roberts, Green's Harbor, Western Bay, Heart's Content and Pouch Cove, his last incumbency. His later years were made sorrowful on account of the death of several of his children. He is survived by his widow, who was a daughter of Capt. F. White, of Greenspond, and five sons, viz., Rev. Fr. R. Matthews, of Cochrane St. Church; Albert, of Montreal; Victor at College in Quebec, and Douglas and Harold at home. The funeral will take place on Sunday.

Municipal Council.

The Mayor and all the Councillors attended the meeting held at 4.30 p.m. yesterday.

The Queen Mother's acknowledgment of the condolences of the Council was received through the Corporation.

Cyril Tessier asked the Council for an analysis of the water of Windsor Lake. He will be sent a copy of the analysis.

The petition of the residents of Hamilton Street for a street crossing was referred to the West End Road Committee.

Thos. P. Jackson asked that a sewerage system and water pipes be laid at his house, Brien Street. A copy of the rules will be sent him.

A petition was received from the residents of Pleasant Street asking that the water service be extended in order that they may connect their houses. Estimate and report was ordered.

Andrew Connors sent in a protest against the erection of a structure on the west end of Crosbie Hotel.

Repairs to their houses will be made by W. P. Kiley, 68 New Gower Street, John Beer, Cookstown Road, R. W. Grant, 21 Bond Street, subject to Engineer's approval.

Frank Wadden will be ordered to stop building on Power Street. The work is not in accordance with plan.

The Sanitary Supervisor reported in connection with the use of the city water by the S. A. Eric.

The residents of Long's Hill, Harvey Road and Bailey Street were notified to connect their houses with the sewer at once.

A sewer will be laid in Young St. Mr. Arthur Desmet, the impounder, made a complaint that a citizen took from him five cows that he captured on Circular Road and was taking to the pound. The members of the Council were surprised that anybody should do the like and requested Mr. Desmet to get witnesses in order to have the party prosecuted.

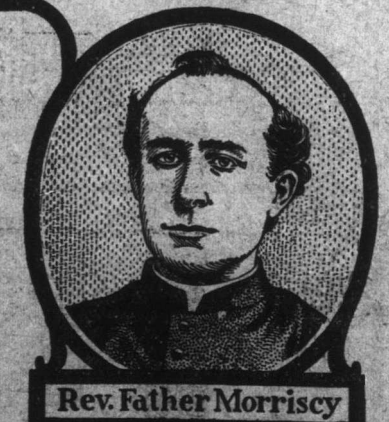
