

Not only were the Germans back over the trenches, which but a short time ago they had taken from the British, but they were pursued by the Highlanders, for over a mile beyond. The net result was that the Ger-mans lost over a thousand men killed and some three thousand mounded, as well as their own advanced trenches from which their final attack had or-iginated, and the British artillery is now sending shells a mile further in-to their ranks.
