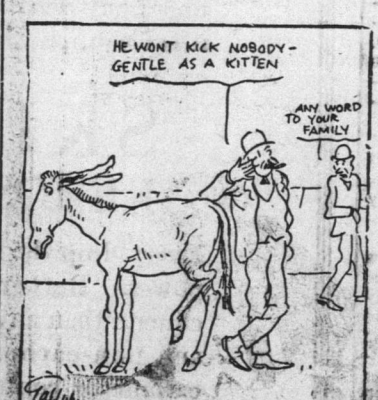

More Dilly Dallying.

AT THE HOUSE.

Characteristic of the present session, yesterday afternoon's sitting of the House of Assembly was remarkably brief. The House opened at 3.25 and closed again at 4.45, the members then retiring to again discuss coalition terms.

The Premier presented a petition, on behalf of the residents of Conche, asking for a motor ferry service, and Mr. Downey presented a petition asking relief from the Government for the large family of Clarence Oldford of Bay of Islands who was suddenly stricken stone blind.

The Budget was again deferred. A Bill respecting Naval and Military Pensions was introduced by the Finance Minister and read a first time.

Correspondence regarding certain fees paid doctors at the General Hospital was tabled by the Colonial Secretary.

The Bill respecting the exportation of Timber was read a third time; and the Bill relating to Retiring Allowances for 13 civil public servants was read a second time.

Other items on the Order Paper were deferred.
