



A Crying Shame.

Dear Sir,—I think it is about time for the people of this Dominion to awake and try and realize what other people are doing. I often wonder why they don't, but they will, and when they do someone will have to answer for the insult that has been given the returned soldiers by sending Police Sgt. O'Neill away on the Labrador with a commission as 1st Lieut. I call it a crying shame; and I wonder at the returned soldiers for allowing it. Is this how the returned soldiers are going to be treated after all they have done for their country? I am not objecting to this man going down on the Labrador, but what I do object to is he being allowed to go in khaki uniform. What is wrong with the Police Sgt. uniform, if he is ashamed to go in it? If he wants to wear a khaki uniform, why not let him volunteer. There are men older than he is in France to-day, and he will not be the first policeman to fight for his country. Some of the police gained honours, but they did not gain them the way O'Neill did. What is wrong with the returned which should be a returned hero's.

I think the returned men are very quiet to allow such a thing to go on without making an effort to stop it. What is their Association doing now? Will any protest be made? If not then they haven't much regard for themselves or for the people who have given their sons to fight in answer to their call for recruits. What did O'Neill ever do? Why was this Commission given him? Who got it for him? These are the questions the public are asking themselves. Will someone answer?
