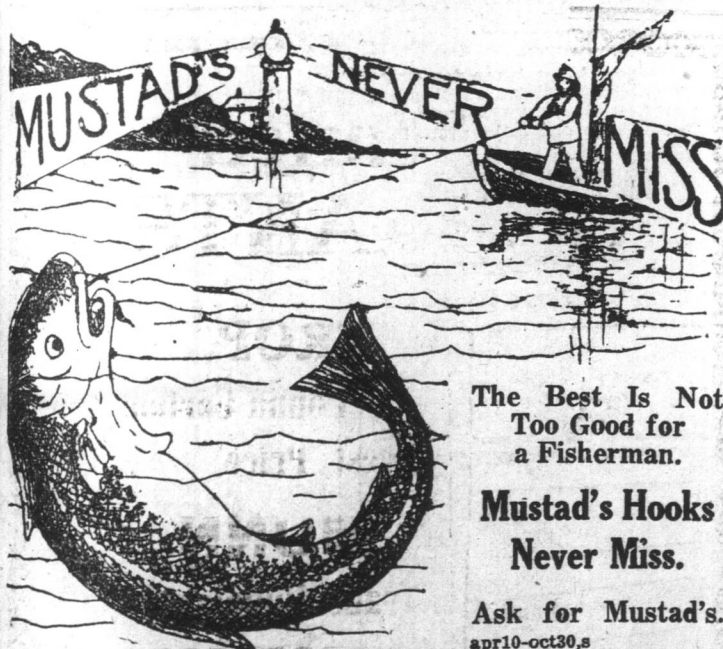

## Dead Now Total 35 in New York Explosion.

France Objects to Germany in the League—  
Seamen on Canadian Steamers Strike—  
Prince of Wales at Trinidad—Miners  
Satisfied With Report.

### EXPLOSION DUE TO TIME BOMB.

NEW YORK, Sept. 17. (By the Associated Press.)—The exact cause of the explosion, which in the twinkling of an eye yesterday at noon, transferred Wall Street, near Broad from a scene of bustling activity to one of dreadful carnage, remains to-night a mystery. Official opinion as expressed by William J. Flynn, Chief of the Bureau of Investigation of the United States Department of Justice, and Fire Commissioner Thomas Brennan, is that the disaster was caused by a T. N. T. bomb loaded with high explosives and reinforced with metal slugs. The early theory that the blast was caused by a collision between an explosive laden wagon and another vehicle seems to have been dispelled by subsequent investigation, although it has not yet been entirely discarded by official investigators. Chief Flynn, who arrived here from Washington last night to take personal charge of the Federal investigation, declared after leaving the J. P. Morgan office late to-day that "from evidence obtained within the last few hours, it has been definitely established that the explosion was due to a time bomb." "The bomb was taken to Wall Street," he added "in a wagon which was blown to pieces. The infernal machine was timed to go off at noon, and apparently was placed in the wagon by a person who was within four blocks of Wall and Broad Streets when the explosion occurred." Six more deaths since midnight brought the total deaths to-night to thirty-five. The number injured including those treated at the scene, in hospitals, and at their homes, was approximately 300.

### FRANCE OBJECTS TO GERMANY ENTERING LEAGUE.

MONTREAL, Sept. 17. A Paris cable to the Montreal Star says the Echo de Paris to-day, stated that the French Government had instructed its representative to the League of Nations Council, Leon Burgeois, that France will withdraw from the League if Germany is admitted to the forthcoming conference at Geneva.

### PRINCE REACHES TRINIDAD.

PORT OF SPAIN, Trinidad, Sept. 17.—The cruiser Renown, with the Prince of Wales on board, arrived here to-day and anchored among the gaily decorated shipping in the harbour. The Renown was escorted from Colon by the cruiser Calcutta, and was joined at Pecos Belterio by the cruiser Caliph. A tremendous ovation was given the Prince and his suite upon their landing. They were met by the Governor, officials and residents with a guard of honor composed of the Royal Sussex Regiment stationed here, marines from Calcutta, local constabulary, and a group of men who fought in the Great War. Addresses of welcome were made on behalf of the Government and the Municipal authorities, to which the Prince replied. An illuminated address presented by the Municipal authorities was the work of a French Nun of the local convent, and was enclosed in a casket made by returned soldiers of the Island's woods. Amidst dense, enthusiastic crowds the Prince drove through the principal streets.

### STRIKE OF SEAMEN.

SAULT STE. MARIE, Mich., Sept. 17.—The general strike of all seamen on the Canadian steamers, which went into effect yesterday, seemed to-day to have paralyzed Canadian Shipping on the great lakes through this port. Four big ore freighters are tied up at the local docks without a man on board other than officers. The passenger steamers Assiniboia and Kewatin, of the Canadian Pacific Line, due here yesterday, did not arrive, and are reported tied up at the docks at Port Arthur. The strike is said to be for an advance in wages for all classes.

### MINERS PLEASED WITH REPORT.

SYDNEY, N.S., Sept. 17. The recommendation of an eight hour day for all employees of the Dominion Coal Co., has been received with approbation by the miners and executive members of the United Mine Workers. Formerly, though the men in the pits were only being employed for the eight hour period, a number of the constructing men, who were occupied around the mines, were working eight hours and a half daily. The finding of the commission recommends that these men be placed on an eight hour shift and they are indeed pleased. The report of the Royal Commission arrived in Glace Bay this morning, and was followed

in quick order by the board members and executive of the United Mine Workers, who are assembled in the town from all the mining fields of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick. To-morrow morning they will be in session to discuss the various articles that are contained in this monthly report. Although few of the executive or the board members have studied the official finding very closely, they have, however, gone over the press reports. A Canadian press representative questioning the different members, was certain that they were much impressed by the report and thought it would be quite satisfactory. Secretary J. W. MacLachlin and Silby Barrett stated that the United Mine Workers would accept the finding and in their opinion, there would be little or no dickering over any of the clauses.

### MacSWEENEY'S CONDITION.

LONDON, Sept. 17. The Irish self-determination League issued the following bulletin early this evening: "Mrs. MacSweeney, who was with the Lord Mayor all afternoon, said he rallied in the early part of the afternoon, but later collapsed again. She reported he was conscious, but very exhausted and in great pain."
