LONDON, July 12 (A.P.)-America is being used as the horrible example by the English anti-prohibitionists in

The Rev. Wyndham Heathcote, of Maidstone, recently addressed a meeting at the Corn Exchange, during which he described the working of the ilicit drink traffic in the United States as he observed it on a recent trip. He produced canes, dummy books and even a cigar capable of carrying small quanities of liquor which he stated were used, with many other novelties, in a continual if unlawful service. America under prohibition, he declared, had become a more corrupt, more criminal and drunken nation.

The speaker said he opposed proh bition because it was subversive to democracy and was opposed to Christianity. The democracy in him, he said, was too strong to allow him to compel his neighbor to do what he did not want to do in the conduct of his private affairs. anese boycott of American goods as required to make business better a result of the passage of the exclusion law by the United States Senate will merely react as a boomerang against those making the protest, in the opinion of leading Japanese industrialists and merchants.

"The United States would never feel a hovcott such as the Japanese people could practice." said N. Ikeda a director of Mitsui and Co. "The United States is so big, has such an enormous domestic market and so many customers in other parts of the world that the elimination of Japan as a buyer would have very little effect on that country. But to Japan such a boycott would be a terrible blow. Japan is virtually dependent on the United States for a wide variety of basic materials. If Japan were to cease buying from the United States, it would mean that she would have to get along somehow without using imported machinery such as we receive from across the Pacific, without petroleum, lumber and raw cotton. If we attempted to secure these things from other countries exclusively, it would be to our disadvantage much more than to the Americans. The whole proposal is childish and rash."

Baron Shibusawa, regarded for many years as the best friend of the United States in Japan, but who expressed deep regret at the action of the American Senate, similarly described the boycott as futile and ill-

"If Japan wants a boycott, let it be a boycott of luxuries and let it be applied to every country," said the baron. "If Japan wants to get out of its present economic dopression, there is one thing that will hasten the change more than anything else and that is concerted abstinence from

luxuries." Shibusawa has urged Japanese immigrants to settle in Formosa, Korea and Hokkaido now that they have been debarred from the United


Religious Demonstration in the Ghetto

New York, July.-The Ghetto is still in a state of disquiet and extra police patrol its teeming streets as a result of a recent outbreak of racial and religious antagonism which followed the death of Jennie Lefkowitz, wife of Dominick Scola, for love of whom she had renounced the religion of her own people and thereby started a flood of religious hatred which for a time threatened to cause serious rioting in the neighborhood. On the day of the woman's funeral mob demonstrations were subdued by force as the police escorted the body accompanied by the husband and his friends to the Church of the Most Precious Blood and thence to Calvary Cemetery.

The howling throngs who had clamored outside the home of Dominick day and night lined the funeral right-of-way by thousands. They gestured threatingly and muttered, but there was no violence.
