Col. Mitchell Raps U. S. Air Service

EXPECTS TO BE ARRESTED FOR HIS UTTERANCES, HE SAYS—CHARGES NEGLIGENCE—PLACES RESPONSIBILITY FOR AIR DISASTERS ON NAVY DEPARTMENTS.

San Antonio, Sept. 7. (A.P.)—Colonel William Mitchell, ace critic of the Air forces, has charged the War and Navy Department with "almost treasonable administration" and "criminal negligence" in a 6,000-word statement, which also included other charges involving the Air Forces of the United States. Colonel Mitchell said he "expected to be arrested by Monday morning" for what he had said.

Colonel Mitchell, whose arguments and views on air matters have gained Congressional and National attention, is air officer of the Eight Corps. His statement, a denunciation of the practices and systems obtaining in the administration of National defence, was forthcoming as a result of the fatal accident of the dirigible Shenandoah, and of the P.N.S. No. 1. "These accidents are the direct result of incompetency, criminal negligence and almost treasonable administration by the War and Navy Departments," he asserted. "As far as aviation is concerned, the conduct by these departments has been so disgusting in the last few years as to make any self-respecting person ashamed of the clothes he wears," Col. Mitchell said. "Were it not for the great patriotism of our air officers, and their hope for a change in condition sooner or later, I doubt if a real man would remain with the colors under existing conditions."

Mitchell declared that the accident to the Shenandoah and the Hawaiian flight plane "is due to incompetence in the Navy Department, and the criminal negligence in ordering the trip."

He reviewed several accidents of the past, declaring that the loss of life in them were due largely to obsolete and improper ships and equipment.

The consensus of opinion among the few War Department officials available over the week-end was that the charges in the statement by Col. William Mitchell in San Antonio were of such a serious nature that disciplinary action against him no longer could be avoided, provided the statement was officially substantiated.

Shipton, near York. At the time of the accident he was motoring to York with Mr. and Mrs. Edward Caffyn, his son-in-law and daughter, and his grandson, Mr. Lawrence Albert Sherman, who was driving. A butcher's van crossed the main road, and Mr. Caffyn at once applied his brakes. The car was forced on to grass by the roadside and caught in a stone hole, with the result that it collided with a telegraph pole. The occupants were thrown out, and Mr. Duke was killed instantly. Deceased was 67, and evidence at the subsequent inquest showed that his head was badly crushed by being struck by the telegraph pole or one of the wind-screen supports.—The coroner expressed the opinion that there had been an error of judgment on Mr. Caffyn's part, but found that the occurrence was a pure accident.—A verdict of "Accidental death" was recorded.

Map Muddles

The statement in a Colonial Office report that "seemingly educated persons could not place Cyprus on the map within 1,000 miles" recalls some official errors of more consequence. An eighteenth-century Foreign Minister handed Chandernagore over to France in the belief that it was a West Indian island, as a result of which

error the French Colony of Chandernagore still exists in India, only twenty miles from Calcutta.

A few years ago the President of the Royal Geographical Society prevented a territorial arrangement in Africa, under which France benefited at the expense of this country, by pointing out to the Foreign Office that it was based on measurements from the meridian of Paris, instead of the Greenwich, as the British had assumed.

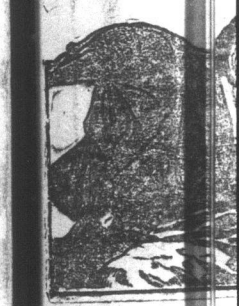
