More Women Than Men in Inebriate Reformatories and Asylums for the Insane

London, Aug. 19 .- Astonishing figures showing the relative morality, sobriety, health and sanity of the sexes, as far as such figures can be taken as a basis of comparison, appear in the first volume of the detailed census report for England and Wales, which was published yesterday. Briefly, the figures show that while the women are more moral than men they are not as sane or as sober.

The statistics relating to the sexes be tabulated thus: Prisons—139 women to 1,000 men rtified reformatory industrial ols-278 women to 1,000 men orkhouse establishments-655 wo to 1,000 men.

TRADE OF THE NORTH

Veteran Trapper and Pathfinder Talks Interestingly of His Experience

Edward Nagle Tells of His more than a generation its deli-Trading With Indians on the Mackenzie

DMONTON, Aug. 19.—One of Ed-monton's veteran fur traders is Mr. Edward Nagle, who is this immer enjoying his first holiin twenty-two years. For that period he and his partner, Mr. Hystop have spent every summer in the North country in quest of skins. Few men in Canada are more familiar with the Peace River coluntry, the Lake Atha-basca region and the Mackenzie river than Mr. Nagle. These are the three great fur-producing districts of the orthland, and for some years Mr Tagle has devoted most of his effort trading with the Indians down the ne Eskimos of the Far North

A person has to travel to Edmonton and talk with a fathfinder like Mr. Nagle to learn how vast is that North-land which he has roamed these many years. He states that steamboatt Fort Smith to Fort McPherson, a distance of 1,300 miles. This adventurer of the North became enthusiastic when he spoke of the grandeur of the river down which he has sailed so many

His Opinion of the Mississippi

A year ago he took a trip south o purpose to see the Mississippi, about which he had heard so much. Comparing the two rivers, he made this characteristic remark, "You could put the Mississippi into the Mackenzie and would take you an hour to find it!" Navigation is open by the beginning of June, but Mr. Nagle recalls one year in which a Hudson's Bay com-pany hoat nearly came to grief in the ice on Great Slave lake on July 7 He has been able, however, to navigate the Mackenzie river from May 24 melt in the spring, the river often

To hear Mr. Nagle's description of mouth is to gain a new conception of the magnitude of our Northern water-ways. When we were boys at school we use to learn to repeat parrot-fashion the name of the Great Slave lake, and, if hard put to it, we could find the little blue patch on the map, but when you hear from the bronzed navigator himself that this lake is five hundred miles long and two hundred miles broad, you are filled with amazement. The Mackenzie river it-self is another wonder in point of size and sweep. In places it is from three to ten miles wide. As the boat sails along over the tide as clear as crystal the fur trader beholds with delight the tall ranks of Norway pine standing stiff and clear against the shore line. In many places great wide above them banks one hundred feet high, formed of hard pan and gravel, and above these again the graceful sil-

The Real Summer Land According to Mr. Nagle, this is the real summer land. The sun up there in that country is so strong that Mr. Nagle testifies that, with his cabin over the -horsepower boiler and Old Sol flaming on the deck above, it was necessary to turn on the hose on the deck to make the ship endurable. It is beof the many hours of sunlight that the people on the banks of the Mackenzie, at the various fur-trading posts, even those within the Arctic circle, can raise splendid vegetables. The finest vegetables ever producd in the North were grown by an English gardener who worked for a bishop at one of the posts. He was an expert in the culture of celery and cauliflower and for several years astonished the natives. But the North lost his hor-ticultural skill, for, alas! he did not get on well with the bishop's wife. Flowers, also, in the Far North are


