—The board of works did not hold its regular weekly meeting last night. There was very little business in the secretary's hands.

—Lieut.-Col. and Mrs. Gartshore, and Miss E. Gartshore, of this city, and Miss M. Gartshore, of Hamilton, have left on an extended trip to the Bermuda Islands.

—Ex-Alderman Scarrow visited his father-in-law, Robt. Bredin, St. Thomas, on Wednesday. Mr. Bredin is the father of the late Engineer Bredin, C. T. R., city.

—Some boards over the roaster at Mayell's spoke mill, on King street, caught fire last evening about 5:15 and necessitated the attendance of the brigade. Damage slight.

—The man who has invented a laundry machine that will turn out stiff collars with pliable button holes deserves a monument just as much as Edison.

—Marketmen desire to call the attention of the transient officer to the large number of small boys who congregate daily on the market and bask in the sun and play marbles instead of going to school.

—A patient at St. Joseph's Hospital named Morkin escaped last night and was found wandering, thinly clad and bareheaded, in the north end by a policeman. He was taken to the police station at 12:30 and afterwards returned to the hospital.

—Harry Jones and Henry Williamson, two draymen, were charged at the Police Court this morning with allowing their horses to stand unattended. They were let go with a warning. George Stone, a vagrant, was given two months in jail. A drunk was discharged.

The young lady had been visiting her aunt near London, when she took ill of inflammation, and died very suddenly last Wednesday. The remains were brought home for burial, and the funeral, which took place last Friday afternoon from her father's residence, was very largely attended. Miss Sides was a general favorite and very highly respected. She had just reached her 23rd year. Her parents and remaining members of the family have the sympathy of the entire community in their great loss.

THE AMAZONS AT THE GRAND.

Last evening the lower portion of the Grand was well filled, when the farcical comedy of "The Amazons" was produced. The play is in three acts. The dialogue contains no end of humorous and witty sayings and ludicrous situations—everything that would place the female sex in a predicament while masquerading in male attire. The marked feature in the production is the excellent cast of characters. Rarely does such a competent and clever number of artists tread the Grand's stage. Every character was pleasing, and never once did the play drag. It was without doubt a clever production. ASSESSABLE WHERE RESIDENT.

Judge Hughes has given judgment in the case of Cain vs. the Corporation of St. Thomas, an action to recover income tax. Plaintiff, who is an engineer on the M. C. R., claimed that as his employment extended from Fort Erie to Windsor, he was not liable for income tax in St. Thomas. Judge Hughes finds that the assessor is obliged to assess all property liable to taxation, including income within the municipality, and that, on the other hand, every person is obliged to give all necessary information to the assessor in regard to property and income, and, if required, a statement thereof in writing. In this case plaintiff had no place of business anywhere outside of St. Thomas, and though his employment took him through various municipalities, in the absence of such place of business, Judge Hughes decides that he was assessable at his place of residence. He being assessed as a householder and resident of St. Thomas, it was held that the income was assessable exclusively within the city under sections 33, 37 and 38 of the Consolidated Assessment Act. Judgment is therefore given for the city and its co-defendant.
