FOR FIFTY-THREE YEARS

The Mechanics' Institute Has Been
Organized.The Annual Meeting—Receipts, Dis-
bursements, Assets and Li-
abilities—Books in the
Library.The 53rd annual meeting of the London
Mechanics' Institute was held last night,
the only members in attendance being
Messrs. Mm. Searrow, president, in the
chair; W. J. Harvey, secretary; Alex.
Harvey, treasurer; John Shopland, T.
Partridge, R. Hannah, Talbot Macbeth,
C. B. Edwards and W. J. Saunby. The
business before the meeting chiefly con-
sisted of the usual annual reports, which
showed the institute in a flourishing con-
dition.The meeting was opened with a short ad-
dress by Mr. Searrow, in which he referred
to the situation of the institute at present
and what effect a free library would have.
The institute was in a peculiar position,
and would have various things to grapple
with. He thought that when the people
voted on the free library question they did
so on the understanding that the institute
would be taken over, and thus avoid a
large expenditure. This would have been
easily done, and would save a great in-
crease in taxation.The financial statement for the year was
presented by the treasurer, Mr. A. Har-
vey. It stated that the members' fees
were very small, but it was accounted for
by the action of the city council in giving
a grant of \$500 in 1893 on condition that
the reading-room and library be left open
to the public. The institute has received
\$250 from the city for the first three
months of this year. The following are the
