Audit Committee's Objections Re Salaries Unheeded.

One Teacher Gets Two Increases This Year, and Another in Sight-Collegiate Masters Want More Money - Ano her Kindergarten Asked For in No. 5 Ward -Growth in the Institute attendance.

From present appearances it is more than likely that the Board of Education will have an over-draft on its appropriation at the close of the year. At the regular meeting of the board last night, the audit committee, in accordance with a motion recently made by Trustee Stephenson, presented a report which contained much useful information on the financial standing of the board on Sept. 30. Mr. Stephenson's motion referred especially to increase in salaries, and the committee reported that the item of \$44,793 set apart for teachers was the exact amount required, and would allow of no increases. However, in March, Mr. B. F. Bryant, then principal of King street school, received a \$100 increase. M. W. Althouse, principal of Rectory street school, was granted a hoist of \$100. Samuel Baker, principal of St. George's school, shared likewise, while Mr. Bryant received \$200. For the further enlightenment of the trustees, the committee secured from City Treasurer Pope a statement of expenditures to Sept. 30. Here are the figures for the publie schools: Receipts-

Total estimated receipts....\$70,637 09 The disbursements were \$50,535 24, leaving a balance of \$20,091 85. Of this sum fully \$16,000 is required for salaries alone, and the balance will scarcely pay for school supplies, reordered, fuel, repairs and outstanding accounts in connection with the work done in the summer holidays. and the mortgage on the Wharncliffe

highway school. poration for the Collegiate Institute was \$23,949, but reductions to the extent of \$2,500 were made, making the actual grant \$21,449. Estimated additional receipts of \$3,600 increased this amount to \$25,049. The expenses of the institute to Sept. 30 were \$16,-33 24, leaving a balance of \$8,415 76. About \$5,900 of this is required for salaries, and the balance would be needed to cover expenses similar to those connected with the public schools.

The audit committee understood that the moneys held by Col. Leys as treasurer of one of the South London schools would be available for the use of the board, and recommended that they be applied on the mortgage eld on the Queen's avenue kinderarten, except insofar as it is needed to prevent an otherwise unavoidable over-draft at the end of the year.

A scheme for the readjustment of the teachers' salaries was also proposed by the committee. The basis was as follows: Kindergarten assistants with depart-

certificates-Whole day, \$1; half day, 75 cents. Transition teachers—Per day, \$1.

Teachers appointed to regular staff and holding third class professional certificates—Minimum, \$250; maximum, \$275, an increase of \$12 50 to be made on Jan. 1 next, and an increase of \$12 50 one year thereafter. Teachers appointed to regular staff

and holding second class professional certificates, and kindergarten directors holding position of directors— Minimum, \$300; maximum, \$425; an increase of \$12 50 on Jan. 1, and a similar increase each year until the maximum is reached.

First class professionals--Minimum, \$325; maximum, \$450; an increase to be given similar to kindergarten direc-Principals with schools under six

rooms, \$600 for first year; maximum, \$750; an increase of \$25 to be made as in the two preceding classes. Principals with schools of six rooms

and over, \$800; maximum, \$900; yearly increase of \$25 until the maximum is reached. VERY GENEROUS.

A report which was expected to create a ruffle was that presented by the audit committee at the last regular meeting. It expressed strong objections to all resolutions whereby the total amount of salaries paid to the staff on April 13 is increased, on the ground that the appropriation for salaries would be exceeded. The report also recommended that all increases deemed necessary be made to apply from Jan. 1 next, as the apparent surplus in any section of the estimates would be fully required for absolutely necessary expenditure not sufficiently provided for.

And at this stage of the proceedings, despite the audit committee's objections, the board became very gener-It was moved in amendment to the report that the salaries of Messrs. Bryant and Baker be increased to \$900. the increase to date from Sept. 1. A two-thirds vote was required to carry it, and it was declared lost on a division of 11 to 6.


