London, Saturday, Dec. 1.

—Now is the time for merchants to plant Christmas advertising. Then will come the time for the thrifty buyer to examine the wares and supply his needs. The early shopper has by far the best choice.

—The Free Press says the attendance at the Liberal Convention for South Middlesex yesterday was poor. What is the use of misrepresenting the facts? The list of delegates in attendance, given in another column, proves the falsity of our contemporary's report.

—Rev. Mr. Madill, who made the bitter attack on Hon. Wilfrid Laurier at St. Mary's, the other day, has always had Conservative affiliations. He is the bosom companion of Hon. Clarke Wallace, the controlling Ontario mind in the Cabinet of Sir John Thompson. Mr. Wallace and Mr. Madill understand each other thoroughly.

—In South Essex the attempt to again foist Mr. Patterson on the constituency as a Conservative candidate was resented by the new convention, the vote being: For Patterson, 23; for King, 67. Mr. Patterson will therefore once more try his luck in West Huron. It is believed, however, that both constituencies will return tariff reform Liberals at the general election, as they did in 1891. There are far stronger reasons today why they should do so than could be adduced in the elections of three and a half years ago.

THE RIGHT AND THE WRONG WAY.

Every fair-minded citizen now concedes that the registration of voters, as carried out immediately prior to the late Provincial election in this city, was an eminently fair proceeding.

The citizens had a voters' list provided for their use that was free from bogus names of all sorts. It was brought right up to the time of the election, and if any man, 21 years of age, was not able to go to the polls it was because he did not possess the necessary qualification.

Now the election is over, citizens generally need neither themselves no more regarding the Provincial lists till the eve of another election—in all probability not for four years to come. Meanwhile, a little flaw in the new act will have been remedied, and the cost of operation—a mere nothing to the individual voter—can be set down. But we say that even if the revision once in four years does cost a few hundred dollars, if it relieves the citizens and political parties of all anxiety and all expense in the interval, the new law will continue to be a positive boon to the community.

How different it is with the Dominion Franchise Act. It is costly, it is vexatious, and when it is completed it is not a fair list. Under it men who are citizens in a foreign land can come back to Canada and kill the good votes of Canadians, provided their names have been wrongfully placed on the lists. The democratic principle of "one man one vote" is not observed, and the man of money is given an unfair advantage over the man of small means. These Dominion lists have again and again been compiled at great expense years in advance of an election. Then when a contest came on thousands of men entitled to vote found themselves disfranchised, while thousands of men who had left the constituency—many of them having gone to the States—were able to return to Canada and decide the fate of the election.

It is this racial, unfair and expensive system that is set up by the critics of the Ontario Registration Act as the ideal method of compiling a voters' list. We say nothing of the inequitable investigations which the Dominion law provides. Our readers know that the Ontario law recognizes honest manhood as the sole qualification for obtaining a vote, but under the Dominion law it has been decreed in this very city that a man who meets with an accident, or who is unfortunate enough to get out of work for a few weeks in a year, and thus has his income curtailed, shall be deprived of the right to vote in a Dominion election, while the cigarette-smoking dulle, who may not have done an honest day's work in his life, can vote without question because his father has money and property. Such discriminations are so un-British as to cause every fair-minded citizen to condemn them. Though such a law could be enforced for nothing, it would not be

worthy of a place on the statute book. But its partial operation has cost the taxpayers of this country upwards of \$1,000,000 in the last few years, and the cost is again being piled up. Yet some people tell us that the simple, efficient, comparatively inexpensive registration act enforced in this city in the recent bye-election should give place to it. How blinded to reason and to every sense of fair play must men be who talk that way!

A FIVE MILLION DEFICIT.

Were Ottawa Ministers able to evade the fact that there will for the current year be a Dominion deficit to the astounding extent of some Five Millions of Dollars it might perhaps be fair tactical policy of the uncourageous sort to rush to the country before having to encounter cross-examination on the floor of the House of Commons, whatever one might think of the lack of Ministerial courage in not facing the music and the lack of Ministerial honesty in not letting the people, whose servants Ministers are, know the truth and the whole truth. The incompetency and extravagance of the Dominion Government have brought things to a pass much in contrast with the competent and economical administration of public affairs in Ontario under the rule of Sir Oliver Mowat.

Let Ministers meet the House like men; not, like cravens, shrink meeting the grand committee of the nation.

Ottawa Ministers must either meet the House, confess the Five Million deficit and impose new burdens of debt and taxation, or their guilt and cowardice must stand exposed before the electorate.

Choose one horn of this dilemma they must. Little comfort will they find in either.

Unanimously Chosen by South Middlesex Liberals

To Contest the Riding at the General Elections.

Big and Enthusiastic Convention at Delaware.

The Old Riding Will Stand True to Its Colors—Speeches by the Candidates and Others.

That the old riding of South Middlesex, Liberal for many years, will stick to its old principles and at the next general election return to Parliament a strong supporter of the Hon. Wilfrid Laurier, is a settled fact. A general election is believed to be near at hand, but though the exact date has not been set, the electors of the constituency made doubly sure not to be taken by surprise, and called a convention for yesterday at Delaware. How the town's excitement did respond! They got to work, chose their delegates for each division, and as a result almost every division in the entire riding had a full representation present. They came from the north, the south, the east, and the west, and included men who had fought many a hard battle for Liberal principles, men who had taken an active part in more than one contest, and many young men who were preparing for their first attack on the policy of protection for monopolies. It was a big gathering and it was enthusiastic, too, and every delegate joined in the enthusiasm.

The proceedings were opened at 2 o'clock by the president of the South Middlesex Reform Association, Mr. D. McGowan, of Carleton Place, with a brief speech. The election of officers was conducted in the best of good humor, and every one was elected by acclamation. The list is:

The Nomination.

Mr. Henry Hardy, reeve of Carleton, said: "I have very great pleasure in nominating the present member, Mr. Robert Boston, as the standard-bearer for the South Middlesex Liberals at the approaching general election. The motion was greeted with loud cheers. Mr. Joseph Howlett seconded. "And I would also beg to take the nomination unanimously," continued Mr. Hardy. This, too, was quickly seconded, and amid applause was carried by a solid standing vote.

The Candidate Speaks.

As no other names were presented the president called upon the present and future member for South Middlesex. Mr. Boston received with a loud applause in which every delegate joined and continued for several minutes. Mr. Boston expressed his sincere thanks to the delegates for making him the unanimous choice of the convention. He went on to tell of how necessary it was for the workers to stand together if they wanted to win, even if it was a "hived" constituency. A Voice—We will, and give your opponents a worse thrashing than the Conservative candidate got in London. (Laughter.)

Mr. Boston, continuing, referred to his career in the municipal council of Lobo, and then got down to his career in the House, the Patron platform and the policy of the Dominion Government. He said that though he had been in the House for only a short time he had heard a great deal of questions and was prepared to stand by his every action. (Applause.) The Government came down with what they called a "reformed tariff," but still in the interests of the monopolies. If they had stuck to it as at first brought down it would have been of some benefit, but monopolies came down to the House and the tariff was back almost to its old place again. The only item which benefited the farmers at all was the reduction of the duty on binders. After dealing with other questions Mr. Boston took up the Patron platform, saying among other things that the principles and aims of that organization were identical in nearly every respect with those of the Liberals, who had steadily fought for these reforms. "It is somewhat surprising to me," said the speaker, "that they should place candidates in opposition to such men as Hon. David Mills and Sir Richard Cartwright. These two have been battling in the farmers' interests session after session. The latter at the last House brought in a resolution which ended the farming community of many of their burdens. It was discussed for over a month, but was finally defeated by a vote of 123 to 72. I should think this would convince the Patrons of the country that Sir Richard Cartwright and the Liberal party are their friends."

Mr. Boston further showed a ridiculous position into which Sir John Thompson had put himself. The many gross scandals brought to light were being investigated last year, and a resolution was moved from the Liberal side of the House asking that all witnesses examined before the public accounts committee be sworn. This was voted down, but in a few days Sir John Thompson, seeing that the country would not stand it, turned around and decided to consent to the resolution. The result was, the Minister of Railways declared, that men had been robbing the country right and left, the excuse being that the Ministers in charge knew nothing about it. Was that a proper way for any servant of the people to try to escape responsibility? Mr. Boston criticised the extravagance of the Government in many respects, and declared himself strongly in favor of the freest possible trade with Great Britain and the United States.

OTHER SPEAKERS.

Mr. J. H. Elliot declared himself ready to support any policy which would put in force, and he hoped by united work a strong verdict would be given in favor of tariff reform. He did not think any Government had the privilege of extracting money from the masses and placing it in the pockets of monopolists.

Arch. Sinclair coincided with Mr. Elliot on the tariff question, and thought they had the right man as their candidate. The large gathering was a sure sign of success. Mr. Boston was an honest and level-headed man, and knew best what the farmers needed.

Ald. Parnell, of South London, made a good speech, in which he declared himself as ready to work for Mr. Boston till the last vote was polled. He attacked a recent statement by Dr. Montague, "that the country was prosperous at the present time, due to the National Policy." "Why," said No. 6 ward's alderman, "it has been the curse of Canada. It has done more injury to the farmers than anything else, and their eyes are opened."

Reeve Hardy, of Carleton, was confident that, judging by the enthusiasm of the meeting, Mr. Boston would be returned by a handsome majority. He also attacked the system of compiling the voters' lists, and spoke in favor of running all elections on the municipal lists.

Secretary Glennie and Mr. John Macpherson, of South London, came to help in nominating a worthy member. "He is not gifted with what is called 'guts,'" said the latter speaker, "as some men are, and you know that such men do not always win. (Laughter.) We had an instance of it in London not long ago." (Continued laughter.)

Cornelius Logan, of the Oneida Reserve, was given a good welcome. He is a favorite speaker at South Middlesex Liberal conventions, and speaks on behalf of the men. "But you haven't left anything for me to talk about," said he. "Other speakers have covered the ground. (Laughter.) I am not a Liberal, but I am a man, and we must fight unitedly no matter who the candidate may be—a colored man, Englishman, Irishman, or Indian—we must work together and we will." His subdivision was being converted to Liberal principle, and a larger majority than ever would be given to the candidate. (Laughter.)

Chief Waddilove of the Maney Reserve, also spoke. He was an old worker, and gave an interesting history of the Liberal Government was in power to be able to keep money in the power the Conservative Government was in. (Laughter.)

The meeting then broke up.

Mr. Geo. H. McDonald, B.A., has been appointed teacher at the Collegiate Institute in Ingersoll. Mr. McDonald is a former student of the school, and was engaged at Lucan until midsummer, when he resigned on account of poor health. He will commence duty in January at a salary of \$800 per year.

Thirteen burglars effected an entrance into the Baker House sample room at Watford the other night by prying open one of the front windows. They helped themselves to a quantity of liquor and cigars and the contents of the till, amounting to about \$12. The Taylor House was also entered the same night, nothing of any account is missing.

Walkerton Telescope: On Tuesday last a number of the neighbors of Mr. Sebastian Kerstine, whose son died a few weeks ago with diphtheria, and who has had much sickness in his family this fall, armed themselves with axes and proceeded to Mr. Kerstine's bush, where they spent the day in cutting wood. Enough was cut to last Mr. Kerstine all winter.

Detective Logan, of London, arrested two prisoners at Goderich Thursday. They belonged to a traveling show and were being taken back to Dundas. When they were at Dundas the other day, it is alleged, they stole some baggage checks at the station. They presented the checks at Mitchell, but, of course, there was no baggage for the company, but were caught in their game.

In Windsor last Wednesday night two white men, named Wm. Cartier and Davis Nagle, got into a fight with two colored men, John Mulder and John Lewis, at the market square. Razors were used, and Mulder was badly cut in the leg. The other two were without arms, and were both arrested and returned to this side.

Cartier and Nagle were also arrested, the former having one of his fingers nearly cut off. They were fined \$25 each.

The residence of Mr. T. M. Holliday, of Downs, about half a mile from Stratford, was completely destroyed by fire on Wednesday night. The family barely escaped with their lives. Mrs. Holliday was almost suffocated, as was her husband, who was also badly burned. The house and furniture was valued at \$2,000; insured in the Perth Mutual for \$2,500. There was also burned in the house about \$430 in cash, besides a number of valuable papers, chiefly notes. These amounted to about \$15,000. Mr. Holliday does not anticipate that this will be a complete loss, as he can prove most of them. The cause is believed to have been the dropping apart of the furnace pipes in the cellar.
