Alexander Scott, a lineman employed by the Electric Light Company, Brantford, received an electric shock while engaged fixing some wires at the top of a pole on Monday. He let go his grasp and dropped to the ground. His injuries are internal and of a very painful character.

James Gemmill, while working in the S. Hadley Lumber Company's establishment, Chatham, made a very painful accident, by which he lost three fingers of the left hand, which were taken off at the second joint. He was putting a thin strip through the joint when his fingers were in some manner caught in the rapidly revolving knife.

As Mr. George Lutes, who lives west of Simcoe, was returning home the other evening the horse gave a sudden jump, and a berry crate on which he was sitting in the wagon overturned, and he was thrown to the road, striking on his head, sustaining injuries which his medical attendant, Dr. Stanton, fears will result fatally. Mr. Lutes is nearly 70 years of age, and was not in the best of health before the accident.

Early Monday morning a west-bound special freight met with a serious mishap about one mile west of Ridgeway. The trucks of a car about the center of the train became loose and jumped the track, throwing six heavily-loaded cars off and causing a bad smash-up. The cars were all bonded ones and going to the States. On a flat-car was a large boiler, and on another was a threshing engine and separator. This car and its contents were badly damaged. The other cars contained general merchandise, principally fine boots and shoes and machinery.

PRESBYTERIAN GENERAL ASSEMBLY

Report on French Evangelization—Greetings from Anglican synod of Huron.

Toronto, June 18.—At yesterday's session of the Presbyterian General Assembly the report of the Board of French Evangelization was taken up. In connection with this, Rev. Dr. Warden announced that he accepted the appointment of himself to the general assembly of the western section of the church, as made by the last General Assembly. He stipulated, however, that he should be given a free bond. The question of his relation to the French evangelization work, with which he has been associated, came up, and it was suggested that all the funds of the western section of the church might be administered by him.

The Assembly received a telegram from Bishop Baldwin, as representing the Synod of the Diocese of Huron, which is now sitting, bidding the Assembly God-speed, as the representatives of a sister church. The terms of the message were almost the same as those of the resolution moved by Principal Sheraton in the Synod of the Diocese of Toronto, which had to do with the withdrawal of the reply on motion of Rev. W. F. Herdridge, Ottawa.

The question of the place of next year's meeting came up. It was resolved, after some discussion, to leave to a committee the question as to whether the next place of meeting should be Winnipeg or not, the committee to report also on the advisability of having a permanent place of meeting and of doing away with the biennial system.

The report of the Hymnal committee was considered, but not finally dealt with.

Found His Body.

Brutal Murder Reported from Parry Sound District.

Killed His Companion and Buried His Body Under a Barn.

Parry Sound, Ont., June 18.—News reached here from Seguin Falls last evening of what undoubtedly has been the most brutal murder. Seguin Falls is a small village on the Parry Sound Colonization Railway, about 25 miles from here, and it was there the tragedy occurred.

Two men of the appearance of tramps, whose names are unknown, came there last Friday together, having walked, they said, from Kenney, a point on the railway line under construction east. They were seen going around there together, and applied at a house for a night's lodging, which was refused.

Since then they were seen no more, but on Monday last the dead body of one of the men was found shoved under a barn. The head was badly battered as if by club, and the clothes removed with the exception of a shirt. The body was identified as that of one of the two men mentioned. It bore tattoo marks on the arm, and a square and compass, and it is understood that deceased had stated that he was a member of the township of Floss.

The other man, also of English, and probably Norwegian or Dutch. He wore a long black coat and a Christy hat, and was found dead, as it is now ascertained, at the top of a hill, five days since the deed was perpetrated. The murderer has a good start. An inquest was held by Coroner Barber, of Emsdale, at Seguin Falls yesterday.

A report comes from Edington, a village lying ten miles west of Seguin Falls, that the supposed murderer has been captured there, but this is not confirmed.

Parry Sound, June 18.—Subsequently an inquest was held, and the jury returned a verdict that deceased (unknown) came to his death through wilful murder, committed by his traveling companion, but his name was unknown. No clue has yet been found as to the whereabouts of the murderer.

A Terrible Accident.

Heavy Bent Falls at a Barn-Building Bee.

And Seriously Injures Two Young Westminster Farmers.

A serious accident occurred in Westminster on Tuesday, as a result of which one young man may lose his life. About a score of men from the immediate neighborhood were engaged in erecting a new barn on the farm of Mr. David Beattie, con. 3.

The work was progressing well when to secure a bent in position, broke, allowing the ponderous beam to fall with a crash.

In falling, it plumed Chas. Laidlaw, a son of Mr. Geo. Laidlaw, of con. 3, of Emsdale, and he was seriously injured. He was struck on the back, and his body so cruelly as to break several ribs from his back, some of which penetrated his lungs. He suffered other internal injuries as well, and will probably die.

Another lad, Mr. Geo. Beattie, was injured, but escaped with a fractured leg and some bruises. He is the son of the owner of the barn. Laidlaw was resting easily today.
