Labor Troubles.

which was discussed in parliament yesterday, is intended to prevent strikes, lock-outs and other labor troubles by enabling the parties to a dispute to get together and talk things over with a view to arriving at a settlement on terms fair to both sides. The machinery proposed by Mr. Mul-ock may not always work up to specifications, but the intention is certainly good. A strike or lock-out hurts em-ployer and employes, though not always equally, for there is a saying that capital can wait while labor starves. The best preventive of labor troubles is for employers to recognize that their workmen have a right to a share in prosperity. When times are hard, the workmen have to share in the effects of the depression. Their wages are reduced, or they fail to obtain continuous employment, and it is often hard for them to keep the pot bolling. Many employers have, during the current season of prosperity, recognized the employes' interest and partnership in the business by voluntarily increasing wages or reducing the hours of labor. The late Mr. Tuckett, of this city, kept the good-will of his employes at all times by recognizing that they were his fellow men, with a right to comfort and happiness as well as to the means of keeping body and soul together. The employer is of course influenced in a general way by the motto, "Buy in the cheapest market and sell in the dearest," but he may make a sad mistake in buying the cheapest labor that can be got. A condition of ill-will or hard feeling in a manufacturing establishment is productive of loss, and when men know that they can get no concessions unless they corner the boss when he is in a tight place, he cannot carry on business to the best advant-Over-haste to become a millionaire has kept many a man from acquiring a competence. manufacturing supremacy has been endangered by the effects of labor troubles at home far more than by foreign competition. The idea of conciliation has been taken up in Britain, and Mr. Mulock follows the British lead. By avoiding strikes much individual misery will be prevented, and the national wealth will be greatly increased, for idleness of capital or labor is equivalent in its results to de-struction of wealth. The education of masters and men to a recognition of the principle of give and take will be of benefit to every interest in the country.
