CAPTAIN MURPHY WINS FIRST PLACE

Last Match of the Military Rifle League Shot Saturday.

The fourth and last match under the auspices of the Military Rifle League was shot off by the two teams from the Seventh Regiment at the Cove ranges on Saturday. The weather conditions were favorable and good scores were made, the wind, in fact, remaining almost exactly the same throughout the whole afternoon.

The special prize and marksman's certificate, donated by the league for each competitor who succeeds in making an average of 94 or over during the whole contest, were won by the following four: Capt. Murphy, who leads with a total of 380 points, an average of 95; Pte. Allan, who holds second place with 371 of a total; and Capt. McCricken, who is third, with 363 points, and Pte. Hayes, who together hold third place with the score of 376 each.

The contest between Pte. Allan and Capt. Murphy for first place, which has been extremely interesting throughout, was in doubt until the very finish. On Saturday Pte. Allan was three points ahead of Mr. Murphy when the two finished with the 500 yards range. At 600 yards, however, the private lost his luck, making seven inners in succession without touching the "bull." On the other hand, Mr. Murphy began with an inner and followed with six bullets, his steady nerve carrying him through his usual success in close finishes. Mr. Murphy's work of Saturday was extremely creditable.

WILL BEAUTIFY NIAGARA'S BANKS

Magnificent Boulevard From Queenstown to Falls Likely To Be Built.

Niagara Falls, July 17. — With the object of eventually making a continuous boulevard from Lake Ontario to Lake Erie along the banks of the Niagara River, the Queen Victoria Park commissioners, accompanied by Hon. Frank Cochrane, paid a visit to this locality Saturday.

J. W. Langmuir and P. W. Ellis, two of the commissioners, and Mr. Cochrane were joined by James Wilton, the park superintendent; L. Clarke Raymond, the recently-appointed commissioner; Evan Fraser, M. L. A. for Welland, and J. C. Roth, superintendent of the International Railway.

A private car, the Ondara, brought them to Queen Victoria Park. Here they waited till 3 o'clock for Hon. Adam Beck, when the party proceeded to Chippewa, where carriages were in waiting to convey them to Fort Erie. The four of inspection occupied the day till 6 o'clock.

At old Niagara, the Minister of Lands and Mines and the park commissioners inspected the military camp ground, which the Dominion Government will abandon.

The area of this common is about 400 acres, and it is a part of the crown domain taken over by the Dominion Government for military purposes.

It has been a military camp ground since 1760, and it is thought it will revert to the Province. The Province, Mississauga stands sentinel on the lake front. The rifle butts are here, Fort George is further up the river, and the front of the camp ground is here.

If the province takes over this property for park purposes the shore must be protected, but it is expected enough land can be sold to leave a splendid strip to be improved and the revenue from the sales would go a long way towards paying for the improvements and maintaining the strip.

Adjoining the parade ground are 80 acres, known as Paradise Grove, which are under lease to the Canada Southern Railway. The railway maintains this property as a picnic ground. It is thickly wooded and desirable as park property.

The river drive to Queenstown is included in the proposed park. The ship of Niagara owns the drive, but the slope belongs to the province. For miles the road skirts the edge, and many American tourists, in handsome residences along the drive.

If the road could be taken over, the Province under the proposed system would rebuild it and make it a boulevard. The extension of the Niagara Falls and Queenstown Electric Railway to Niagara is one of the probabilities of the future.

At Queenstown Heights the Province owns about 100 acres of the finest park land in Ontario. At Brock's monument a magnificent view of the river stretches to Lake Ontario is obtained. Here the commissioners propose to acquire additional property, giving them the whole of the river, a portion of which, dirty below the mill race, is known as the Jennings property.

The road through the park on the river bank, which is owned by the Dominion Government, which neglects it, and negotiations will be opened to have the road transferred to the Province.

The trolley right-of-way all the way to the falls is owned by the Province, the company having a franchise for 60 years, with the privilege of renewing for two periods of 30 years each.

There is ample room on each side of the track for the fruition of the land-architect's ideas, and before many years the river will be a natural asset improved on systematic lines.

After passing the two cantilever bridges at Bridgeport, the run to Queen Victoria Park is a pleasant one, splendid homes lining one side of the drive.

The park itself is torn up by the contractors, who are installing the plants of the three electrical development companies, but in two or three years the natural beauty of the place will be restored, with a few things added. Beyond Chippewa, there is a Government road all the way to Fort Erie. It was taken over by the Province two years ago, and something is being done every year to beautify it.

The road is 66 feet wide, and huge waterfalls are to be seen. Where the river joins Lake Erie, the Province has possessed itself of a park, which, too, will be improved.

Mr. Cochrane expressed himself as favoring the addition of a park scheme of improvement, so as to make the Canadian side of the river a great attraction, than ever for visitors from the United States.

One of the results of the carrying out of the scheme will be the influx of American motorists, who will build mansions along the boulevard, thus contribute to the district's wealth. There are many such here now. One of them, Larkin, a soap manufacturer, has bought several farms between Queenstown and Niagara, and has spent thousands of dollars improving them. His barns are the finest in the Province, it is asserted.

Arctic Explorer Sails for North in Another Attempt.

New York, July 17.—The Roosevelt, in which Captain Robert E. Peary hopes to reach the North Pole, started on her long voyage at 2:10 p.m. yesterday.

Captain Peary and a party of guests were on board at the start and remained with the ship on her trip down the bay, but they left her at Narrrows, returning to the city on a tug.

Captain Peary started by rail for Sydney, C. B., where he will join the ship.

A launch, bearing a party of excursionists, attempted to run close alongside of the Roosevelt after she was under way, and nearly collided with her.

The Roosevelt was saluted by many steam and sailing craft on her way to sea. She passed out the Narrows at 4:04 p.m.

SMALL HIDING-PLACE OF CZAR

Emperor of All the Russias Covers at Peterhof to Escape the Assassins.

Peterhof, July 16.—Nicholas the Second is here at Peterhof, on the Gulf of Finland. For the ornamental purposes for which in other countries emperors exist, he might just as well be in the Desert of Gobi.

An angular, ugly tower, painted muddy-yellow, topped by an eagle-crowned flagstaff, is all that can be seen of his abode. That can be seen of his court is an unromantic individual in shirt-sleeves brushing his hair before a looking-glass in the tower window. It needs keen eyes and a field glass to see even these. The hundred eyes of Argus could see no more.

The rest is monastic seclusion, impenetrable mystery—and tireless gossip. Persons who hire boats and row in the brown waters of Cronstadt Bay catch a glimpse of a brief glimpse of the palace facade. But at present, anyone approaching the little harbor where boats are kept is promptly repulsed by a naval sentry.

A forest of birches, poplars, and pines curtains the hiding-place of the Emperor. Almost everywhere, an exandrika Park and ending in a muddy, red-carpeted shore, is a palace facade painted white and picked out with a curious combination of orange and salmon pink.

There are enough sentries to slay all the bomb-throwers in Russia, and as if sentries were not sent, an exandrika outside is patrolled with swarthy Circassians in blue caftans and flourishing swords.

The shore at Peterhof is muddy, stone-strewn, and overgrown with weeds. To bathe you must go several miles into the sea.
