
Sailors Bring Story of Great Hardship From South Africa.

San Francisco, Oct. 28.-A story of hardships as castaways in the South Pacific as told by seven Chinese who arrived on the steamer Manchuria from Hong Kong. They formed the erew of the barkentine Ebster, which was wrecked on a reef 700 miles from Freemantle, Australia. For 75 days they labored to repair the little vessel so it might again put to sea, subsisting on a scant amount of ship's stores and fish and roots found on the almost barren island. The repairs were completed on May 26 last, and Captain Robison, of the barkentine, proposed to sail for South America. At this the crew mutinied, and for punishment they were left for seven days on the 1.793 island while the captain stood off with the vessel. Then they were taken aboard in irons, but later released and taken to Cocos Island, where fresh water and supplies were obtained and 131 from this place they eventually made 120 their way to Hong Kong.
