

GRAND TRUNK BRAKEMAN MANGLED UNDER FREIGHT TRAIN

Terrible Death of Mr. D. L. Glendon, of Sarnia, While on a West-bound Special.

NEW SHOES BLAMED FOR THE ACCIDENT

Evidently Slipped From the Top of the Train—Remains Were Mixed Up With Wheels.

The wearing of new boots, which he had purchased yesterday afternoon at Niagara Falls, caused Brakeman D. L. Glendon, aged 23, of Sarnia, to slip while running over the top of the cars of extra westbound Grand Trunk freight No. 81, last night, about 7 o'clock.

Fell Between Cars.
He apparently fell between the cars a short distance west of Wortley road, and when a few minutes after, the train had left the London yards, Engineer Laing, of Sarnia, noticed that his front-end brakeman was not in his usual place, and stopped the train near the Wiartonville road. Glendon's body was found horribly mangled and mixed up in the wheels of the fifth car from the engine.

A Terrible Sight.
Part of Glendon's head lay farther back on the track, and his body was terribly torn.

The right hand was cut off, and the left arm and parts of the body bruised and beaten from being tossed around under the train.

Spare Brakeman.
Glendon was a spare brakeman on the Grand Trunk, and on Thursday left his home and ran through to the Falls. Yesterday he left there on the return trip to the tunnel. He had only been on the road about six months. His father, D. L. Glendon, of Sarnia, is a retired Grand Trunk conductor.

Inquest Will Be Held.
The remains were brought to the city in a Grand Trunk baggage car that had been sent to the city, and engine as soon as word of the accident was received.

Coroner MacLaren was notified, and had them removed to the undertaking parlors of Smith, Son & Clarke, at 100 Adelaide street, where the inquest will be held, and the jury viewed the body at noon.

Watchman Saw Him.
Neil McDougall, the watchman at the Ridout street crossing, noticed the westbound freight, when it was passing last night, and stated that Glendon was in his place at the front end of the train when the train stopped on its way up the hill. Mr. McDougall thought it was a fall, and did not know of the accident until one of the crew ran back to the station to report the occurrence.

Pay Day on G. T. R.
Yesterday was pay day on the Grand Trunk, and Glendon had apparently cashed his check, and was carrying \$20 in his pockets. Extra westbound freight No. 81 was in charge of Conductor H. Buckle, of Sarnia.

Sister of Deceased.
Mrs. Arthur Pearson, of St. Thomas, sister of deceased, passed through London this morning en route for Sarnia, where she and her husband, who is on the staff of the St. Thomas Times, will attend the funeral. Mrs. Pearson stated that her brother stated 39 years old, and had only been railroading for two months. He went, she said, very much against the wishes of his father, who was afraid that some accident would befall him.

Father in Calgary.
Mr. Henry O. Pearson, father of the deceased, is at the present time in Calgary, and has been communicated with and will, it is expected, return home at once. Mrs. Glendon, mother of the deceased, is only a few miles from the effect of a severe fall, with which she has been laid up for some time.

D. Lorne Glendon is survived by his father and mother, four sisters—Mrs. Wm. Walker, of Sarnia, Mrs. Arthur Pearson, of St. Thomas, Mrs. Arthur Waltham and Mrs. W. Crask, of Sarnia—and three brothers—Gordon, Harry and Charles, all of Sarnia. The family came originally from Brantford, where they are well known. The jury viewed the body this afternoon and the remains will be forwarded to Sarnia this evening.

Sarnia, Ont., Dec. 18.—Local railway circles were greatly shocked to learn of the terrible death of Brakeman D. Lorne Glendon at London last night. He was twenty years of age, and had been in the employ of the Grand Trunk about six weeks. He was a G. T. R. freight conductor of this place, who is at present employed at Calgary, where he went several months ago.

Besides his mother, with whom he resided, he leaves several brothers and sisters, one of whom is Mrs. Arthur Pearson, of St. Thomas.

BOUND FOR ERIE.

MODERN SYSTEM BADLY NEEDED

Grand Jury Brings in Presentment Regarding the Court House and Jail.

CARE OF WEAK MINDED
Recommendation is Made That Provision For Looking After Such Prisoners Should Be Made.

The grand jury at the county court this morning brought in their presentment, in which they again took up the question of the court house heating and ventilating system, of which they described as inadequate, and recommended a more modern and effective system being installed. They also recommended that the Government provide a suitable institution for the care of the weak-minded, one case of such nature being represented in the jail at present.

The Presentment.
May it please your honor, your grand jury at the present sitting for the county of Middlesex beg to thank your honor for the lucid exposition of the duties, which, as grand jurors, we are called upon to perform.
In the discharge of our duties we visited the jail, which we found in a very clean and well kept condition. The persons there incarcerated were eleven males and four females, all of whom, with the exception of two, are confined under confinement. During our examination of the prisoners we found there was one case of a young female, being of weak mind. We, your jurors, consider this not a fit or proper place for the confinement of such prisoners, and would suggest that the Government take steps to provide a suitable establishment or institution for the keeping of such persons.
We also recommended that repairs, where the plaster has broken away in corridors and cells, should be repaired without delay.

Heating and Ventilating.
We have examined closely into the heating and ventilating of the jail and courthouse, and consider the present system quite inadequate to the requirements. We would strongly recommend that a more modern and effective system of steam or hot water be installed to heat, not only the courthouse and jail, but also the county buildings adjacent thereto.
In the discharge of our duties we visited the Asylum for Insane. We were received very courteously by the superintendent, Dr. Robinson, who very ably conducted us through the various departments and buildings, and we were much impressed and gratified with the excellent condition in which we found all details. We found there confined undergoing treatment 1,086 patients, 136 of whom were admitted in 1908, and the number discharged 123, and 44 removed by death. We were particularly pleased with the recent improvements, and the new building, which will be no doubt of great benefit to the inmates.

Victoria Hospital.
We also visited Victoria Hospital and were received by Superintendent Heard in a very kind and courteous manner, and were afforded every facility for making a thorough inspection of said institution. We found there a total of 136 patients, who were well cared for and the building in a clean and sanitary condition. We congratulate the city and county on the magnificent accommodation which is here provided.

Judge's Reply.
His honor, in reply, thanked them for their presentment and drew their attention to the fact that not only was the heating and ventilating of the court house and jail inadequate, but also extravagant as well, and he assured them that he would bring their presentment to the notice of the proper authorities.

One Case Heard.
The case of Matheson against Wade, which was adjourned from yesterday afternoon, was the only case heard. In it his honor pointed out that the agreement made between the parties was that the employees were to get from the defendant such things as were necessary at the expense of the plaintiff. He, therefore, gave judgment for the plaintiff, subject to any changes he might see fit to make in the statement presented, on the grounds that the articles charged for were not necessary.

The county court then adjourned till Wednesday next at 2:30, when the case of Morris against the G. T. R. will be heard.
The sessions will meet on Tuesday at 10:30, for the selection of jurors.
A Creditable Work.

BETTING 2 TO 1 ON THE LIBERALS

Although Unionists Are Boasting of Coming Victory.

LLOYD-GEORGE'S SPEECH
His Address to Nonconformist Leaders Aroused Hearers to the Highest Pitch.

London, Dec. 17.—The Unionist newspapers bristle with resentment against Chancellor Lloyd-George's passionate appeal to the Nonconformists last night, in which he tried to make the election fight one against the peers, the Established Church and the brewers, three powers which, he said, were impregnable, except at the polls. There were, he pointed out, only three Nonconformists in the House of Lords, which constituted a packed jury. He told the men of the Free Churches, whom he addressed, that they were going to worship as they pleased, but that the blood shed in earlier days by Nonconformists, Anomalies of the Campaign.

The speech certainly enthused the audience to a wild pitch, even if it was somewhat undisciplined, less radical members of the Jesuitic Administration, who are not yet prepared to repudiate the Established Church and inherited privileges.
Lloyd-George fired his audience with a description of a great castle, opposed to which stood the tall, thin, and shrunken figure of the man who was to be elected, and the only place in the community that stood up to the castle.
The Chancellor closed with an impassioned appeal.

T. J. LYNCH ELECTED NATIONAL PRESIDENT

Former Chief of Umpire Staff Made Head of the Big League.

New York, Dec. 18.—Thomas J. Lynch, of Cincinnati, former chief of the staff of umpires, was today elected president of the National League. John A. Heydler, former president of the league, was elected secretary and treasurer of the organizations. The elections of Mr. Lynch and Mr. Heydler were unanimous and the magnates adjourned to meet again in February.

HAROLD RICHARDSON ON A VISIT TO LONDON

His Armor Plate Has Been Tested Again and Accepted by British Admiralty.

Mr. Harold Richardson, who was a passenger on the Mauritania on her last trip from Liverpool to New York, told a brief visit to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Richardson, this morning, and then left for Chicago, where he will meet his wife and children and spend Christmas with them. He will return to London, England, about the middle of January, and will reside there in future. His armor plate for British battleships has recently undergone a second severe test, and was found to be perfectly satisfactory, and has been finally accepted by the British admiralty.

ENGINEER CHIPMAN SPEAKS OF SEWERS

Present System Is Big Enough if Storm Sewers Are Provided.

Mr. Willis Chipman, the well-known engineer of Toronto, is in the city today investigating the sewerage system. He was engaged with Assistant Engineer Wright in checking the flow of the sewers and collecting other data.
"A large number of storm sewers have been attached to the sewer system," he stated to The Advertiser. "The result has been that the outlets have been choked up. The sewer level from ordinary sewage has been raised from 12 inches to 15 inches since 1888, not a very serious increase. Nevertheless, the storm sewage has choked the system up. I am merely checking the figures of Engineer Wright, and I will make my report later on. The system is adequate for ordinary purposes, but it is not large enough to carry off the storm water also."
Mr. Chipman will return to Toronto this evening.

BURGLARS ENTERED A DOWN TOWN OFFICE

Mr. J. J. Turners Premises Were Gone Through But Little Was Taken.

The office of Mr. J. J. Turner, the broker, on the fourth floor of the Bank of Toronto building, was entered by burglars this morning, but though they did a great deal of damage in the way of disturbing papers, as far as Mr. Turner could discover, by a cursory examination, they had not removed anything.
The iron fire escape enters into the window of Mr. Turner's office, and the intruders must have come up this way, as there are marks of an attempt to pry the frame of the window loose. Evidently finding this too difficult a task, the burglars evidently broke the glass, and from the appearance of the room when Mr. Turner arrived this morning, the intruder had evidently made a very systematic search.

BRAKEMAN DIBBS STABBED BY PIN

Was Helping Lady With Basket When He Met With an Accident.

Mr. Ed Dibbs, the big Irishman, whose gallant efforts to help a lady with a basket, met with a rather unusual accident yesterday afternoon. Mr. Dibbs is the brakeman on the Sarnia train, and in his "Square of Dames" style he was helping the ladies up the vestibule, when one of them dropped a basket. Immediately the gallant Irishman stooped to pick it up, and in the process he was wearing one of those 28-inch military erections, bristling with latpins, stooped at the same time. The result was that one of the pins ripped a long tear in the braken's check, and only missed his eye by a fraction of an inch. Though the blood was flowing from the cut, Mr. Dibbs only smiled, as though he really enjoyed it.

COMMITTEE GRANTED MATTRESS CO. REQUEST

A Fixed Assessment and Free Water Will Be Given the Concern.

After the reporters had gone home last night, Ald. Ferguson, who had been in Toronto, and Ald. Stevens, who had been out of the city on a case, turned up, and a regular meeting of the finance committee was held. The recommendations of the minority were confirmed. The only new business was the request of the Ontario Spring Bed and Mattress Company for a fixed assessment and for free water, which was granted.

SOLICITOR'S FEES.

The bill of Mr. T. G. Meredith, K.C., solicitor for the city, was presented, amounting to \$1,894. Of this \$150 was for the London city bill, and \$425 for costs for the R. H. Smith vs. London suit. Of course this latter sum does not cover all the expenses, the costs of the division court, to be charged against the council of 1910.

VOTE OF THANKS.

There was a vote of thanks tendered to Ald. Ferguson, the chairman, Ald. Parsons, Mayor Stevely and Ald. Stevenson, referred to the excellent manner in which he had conducted business during the year. Ald. Ferguson in reply spoke of the kindness of the division court, the committee, and hoped that in the fortunes of war would be successful.
