TORONTO, Nov. 12.—Receipts at the Union stockyards were exceedingly heavy yesterday, including 3,786 head of cattle alone. The general feeling of the market was distinctly weaker. There was not nearly sufficient inquiry to absorb supplies, and considerable numbers were left over. The result was a fall off in left over. The result was a fall off in the market values of high-grade cattle of about 15c and fully 25c reduction in the prices of inferior beasts. The over-supprices of inferior beasts. The over-supply of poor and common cattle had a depressing effect on heavy choice offerings, and the market was draggy. Hogs were considerably weaker, while small meats about held their own. For milkers and good butchering culls the market was strong at advanced prices. Montreal buyers were in the market, and some export steers sold for shipment there for butchering purposes at \$5 60 to \$5 10, some 15c less than was given for the same quality last week-end. Good to choice butchering last week-end. Good to choice butchering for canners. For choice butchering bulls there was a good demand, and, centrary to the trend of most other cattle, prices strengthened. They brought from \$5 to \$5 50, while common to mediums brought from \$3 50 to \$4 75. For milkers there exists an increasing demand. Good beasts sold at \$5 to \$10 higher yesterday, prices ranging from \$65 to \$85 each, while for inferior grades from \$45 to \$65 was raid. paid. Springers were steady. Feeders and stockers were easier. Distillery buyers are now filled up, and not so many are being called for from country points, although considerable numbers have gone there during the last few weeks. Good although considerable numbers have gone there during the last few weeks. Good distillery feeders, 1,000 to 1,050 lbs, went at from \$5.10 to \$5 50. The market was well supplied with light stockers, for which inquiry was dull. Hogs were ten to twenty cents lower again. They are so much above the prices of other years at this season that the trade feels they should come down. They sold at \$8, fed and watered and 7 cf.


