JAPAN AND CHINA LIKELY TO AGREE

Nipponese Waive Claims As
To Appointment of Political
Advisers.

Jap Garrison at Hankow Re-
ported To Be Digging
Trenches.

[Canadian Press.]
PEKING, China, Feb. 25.—The outlook for an adjustment of the differences which have arisen between China and Japan have improved distinctly. The conferences between the two governments, which it is reported are progressing toward a compromise. The most important step yet taken in this direction was disclosed here today. The Japanese Government has given indications which are regarded as definite, that it will not insist for the present upon the group of general demands which it presented. It included the chief points on which China based her resistance to the representations from Tokyo. The principal demands which China is reported thus to have waived for the present are outlined as follows:

Waives Advisers' Clause.
The Chinese Government shall consult Japan before choosing foreign advisers in political, military and financial matters, and if such advisers are employed, Japanese shall be employed. China and Japan shall police jointly important places in China, or Japanese shall be preferred in case foreign police advisers are employed. China shall purchase from Japan at least one-half of the arms and ammunition it uses hereafter, otherwise an arsenal shall be established in China employing Japanese experts and materials. Japan shall have special privileges in the Province of Fukien and shall be consulted first in case foreign capital is required in the province for railroad construction, shipbuilding, mining and harbor improvements. Japan shall have the same rights as other nations to establish missions, schools and churches throughout the country, with the privilege of propagating Buddhism. Japan shall enjoy certain enumerated rights in connection with the construction of railroads.

SIR WILLIAM GOAD, VETERAN OF CRIMEA, DIES IN POORHOUSE

Landed in New York on Day Lincoln Was Shot—
Exhausted Means, Settled in Detroit—Friend
Will See After Burial.

DETROIT, Feb. 25.—Sir William Thomas Goad, a former British army officer and veteran of Crimea, is dead in the Wayne County poorhouse at Etoile. He was 86 years old and son of Sir Thomas Goad, a wealthy tea planter in India.

Thirteen years ago, under the name of Captain Wm. Butler, a name assumed to hide his identity from the world, Sir William came to Detroit. His wife had died a few months before in British Columbia, where the old soldier had lost his all in unfortunate land deals.

During the years Sir William lived in Detroit he made home with Mrs. G. Rogers, at 50 Edmund Place. Although he was without means of support, his manner, education and refinement gained him many friends.

With the rank of captain, Sir William Goad served through the Crimean war. He afterwards resigned his commission in the army and came to the United States, hoping to enlist in the United States army.

Landing in New York on the day of the Lincoln assassination, he found the war principally over, and attempted to devote himself to business pursuits for which, however, army life had fitted him and as a result he lost what means he possessed.

A close friendship formed with Tracy McGreggor, a wealthy philanthropist, will keep the body from being buried in pauper's field.

"MAN FROM BRUCE" NOT A FIT SUBJECT FOR THE C. M. T. METER

Tories Failed To Provide a
Funeral For William
McDonald.

TORONTO, Feb. 25.—On the continuation of the budget debate in the Legislature this afternoon "the man from Bruce," William McDonald, kept the house in good humor while he parried hard against the defence of the minister of agriculture, and finally drew from that urbane gentleman that the Government was not sure that it was going to reduce the grants to rural fairs by one half. In fact they hadn't quite made up their minds. "If when the proper time comes and the Government can pay—if they think they can do so, it will certainly be done," said Mr. Duff.

"Some of you did not expect to see me here again," taunted Mr. McDonald, reminding the members of the government of last session.

"You did not expect yourself," countered a Tory member.

Not His Funeral.

"Remember, I said it was hard for a man to look pleasant at his own funeral. It turned out to be not my funeral but the other fellow's. What saved me was that the people followed my course in the Legislature and saw that I took the same action here as on the hustings." (Applause.)

Coming to discuss the budget, Mr. McDonald had something to say about "McGarry's irresistible smile," and commented, "I believe it was on him through this deficit."

This was a time for economy urged the speaker, and a start had been made in some places where they could afford to cut. He, however, did not agree with a reduction of grants for country fairs.

**CURE FOR TETANUS
GIVEN TO WORLD**

Rockefeller Investigators An-
nounce New Method of
Treatment.

NEW YORK, Feb. 25.—Announcement was made today on behalf of the Rockefeller Institute of the invention of a new method of treatment, both designed to reduce the mortality from tetanus among soldiers wounded on European battlefields. Twenty-five apparatuses, it was said, had already been sent to Europe by the institute for use on the battlefield, and patents to the invention had been thrown open so that whoever wished might manufacture and use the apparatus.

The institute's investigators have found, it was said, that most of the deaths occurring among wounded men are due to tetanus and that the method of treating tetanus has drawn backs which make it impossible to save as many of the wounded as might be saved by a more available method.

An injection of a solution containing opson salts into the membranes of the spinal cord is a part of the method of treatment, it is announced. To Dr. J. M. J. of the institute, is given credit for the new method.

The belief is expressed that with this method of treatment and the use of the new apparatus—which is designed to act in artificial respiration—many more lives will be saved.

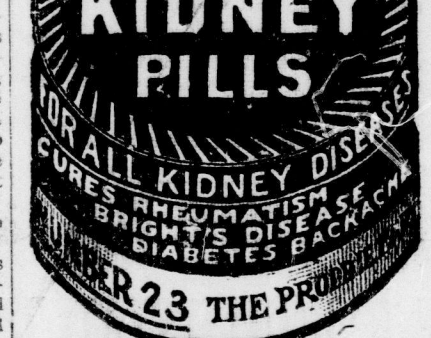
INCREASE LICENSES OF LIQUOR SHOPS

TORONTO, Feb. 25.—The report of the chief license officer for Ontario shows that a good deal of trade formerly enjoyed by the hotel bars has been diverted to the liquor shops since the Government enactment two years ago prohibited the bars from selling bottled goods.

This has had a serious effect on the 5 per cent commission on hotel bar receipts levied by the Government, which last year fell off no less than \$67,000 from 1913. The result will probably be an advance in the cost of the liquor shop licenses.

LONDON, Feb. 25.—4:05 a.m.—Most of the Norwegian exporters of dried codfish have suspended exports to Germany owing to submarine attacks on Norwegian ships, says a dispatch to the Daily Mail from Christiania.

STREETS LINED TO WELCOME GEN. PAU

Roumanians Make Demon-
stration When He Visits
Them.

LONDON, Feb. 25.—Two news agency dispatches received in London today from southeastern Europe describe the warmth of the reception lately given General Paul Pau, of the French army, in Roumania and in Serbia.

General Pau recently has been in Russia, and it is evident that he is being employed by the French Government on special missions. A dispatch from Bucharest, Roumania, says he was given a hearty welcome upon his arrival and that he made himself popular in the capital.

Crowds Lined Streets.
The message from Nish, Serbia, says General Pau came there from Roumania. At the station the French commander was welcomed by Premier Pachitch, the Serbian minister of war, and other members of the cabinet. As he drove to the French legation he was given an ovation by the crowds which lined the streets.

A third dispatch from Sofia, Bulgaria, says General Pau's trip through Roumania was expected to stimulate feeling in that country in favor of the entente powers, Great Britain, Russia and France, in spite of the fact that the political situation in Roumania is still very uncertain.

Wants to Go to War.
Senator Dobrescu has made a speech in the Roumanian senate urging the abandonment of his country's neutrality. The senator declared that only by such a course could the aspirations of the Roumanian people be realized. A representative of the cabinet that the Government was fully conscious of its responsibility, and appealed for the support of all parties.

CORRAL ALL GRAIN, THEN APPORTION IT

LONDON, Feb. 25.—3:30 p.m.—A dispatch to Reuters' Telegram Company from Venice says:

"The Austrian Government is contemplating entire stocks of grain and flour in the monarchy. After an approximate estimate is made of the available supply, a per capita apportionment will be announced and a distribution made through the local authorities. Severe fines and other penalties will be inflicted on any person for attempting to 'corral' supplies of grain and flour."

"The Government has issued an order under which 300,000 acres of land which had been used in the cultivation of the sugar beet are made available for grain production. It is said that Austria will receive only maize from Hungary."

Berlin, Feb. 25.—Via London.—The weekly statement of the Imperial Bank of Germany shows the following changes:

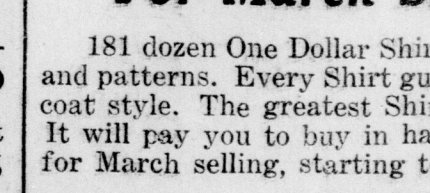
