Electric Equipment for Springbank Plant.

ESTIMATED COST \$19,000

System Proposed By Buchanan Will Develop 500 Horsepower.

At the regular meeting of the utilities board yesterday afternoon, a re-commendation of General-Manager E. V. Buchanan that no money be spent on repairs to the old pumps at Springbank but that new electrically operated turbines be installed at an approximate cost of \$19,000 was adopted. Mr. Buchanan pointed out that it would be insatisfactory to spend \$10,000 repairing old pumps, which at best give an uncertain service when for a little more the most up-to-date equipment could be secured. A system such as he proposes will develop 500-horse power. The commissioners decided to gran




