

ITALIANS CONTINUE SMASHING AUSTRIANS IN CARSO CAMPAIGN

3,498 More Prisoners Taken on Friday.

HEAVY TOLL IN MUNITIONS

Austrians Not Only Lose Men, But Much Equipment, in Cadorna's Drive.

ROME, via London, Nov. 3.—In the zone from Gorizia to the Adriatic Sea the Italians have captured additional points of vantage from the Austrians and taken 3,498 more prisoners and guns, machine guns and quantities of arms and ammunition, according to the official communication issued today.

The text of the communication follows: "Julian front: From Gorizia to the sea heavy fighting, which resulted in further successes along the northern brow of the Carso Plateau, continued yesterday. Here the troops of the 11th Army Corps, who repulsed violent counter-attacks during the night, took strong positions on difficult ground east of Veliki Kribach and Mount Pecina.

"After taking several trenches and clearing the enemy out of woods and caves, the 4th and 45th Divisions, in spite of an intense artillery fire and counter-attacks, held the line running from Mount Faite over the heights of Point 319 to Point 229, on the Oppacchia-Castagnavizza road, 750 metres west of the latter.

Maintain Positions. "On the remainder of the front east of Gorizia and from the sea to the sea, all the positions gained by our troops November 1 have been maintained, notwithstanding incessant attacks, which were supported by concentrated artillery fire.

"During the day we took 3,498 prisoners, including 116 officers, among them a brigade commander, a regimental

commander, and three field officers. Two mountain machine guns and large quantities of arms and ammunition and war material of all kinds also fell into our hands.

FIFTY MILLION LOAN PLACED BY RUSSIA IN UNITED STATES

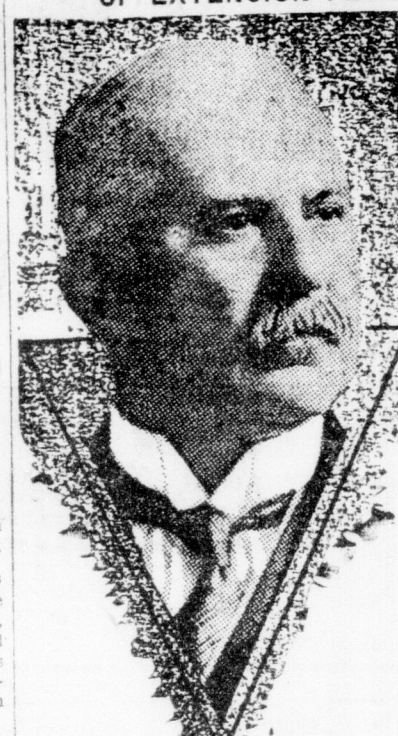
Will Be a Direct Obligation of the Czar's Government.

[Canadian Press.] New York, Nov. 4.—The completion of negotiations with the Russian Government for a \$50,000,000 5 year 5 1/2 per cent loan by the National City Company, which is controlled by the National City Bank, brings the total borrowings here of foreign countries, with the exception of South America, to more than \$2,000,000,000.

Negotiations for the present Russian loan covered a period of more than three months, and at one time it was said, a loan of as high as \$150,000,000 was considered by American bankers. The former Russian loan established a credit in this country for \$50,000,000, which was to run for three years. Simultaneously the Russian Government established a credit of \$50,000,000 rubles in favor of the banking group at a fixed rate of three rubles to one dollar.

A part of the present loan, it is understood, will be used in paying for a portion of \$50,000,000 railroad equipment orders placed with American manufacturers about two months ago. Associated with the National City Company in the negotiations are J. P. Morgan, the Guarantee Trust Company, Kidder, Peabody & Co., and Lee, Higginson & Co. The loan will be a direct obligation of the Imperial Russian Government. Among the details yet to be completed is the price at which the loan will be offered to the public. The yield on this loan was a little more than 5 1/2 per cent.

GOVERNMENT WILL ASK FOR FURTHER TERM EXTENSION

To Appeal to the British House for Power.

ANNOUNCEMENT BY KEMP

Queen City Member Came Direct From Capital With Portentous Declaration.

TORONTO, Nov. 3.—Hon. A. E. Kemp, who stated that he came direct from cabinet deliberations at Ottawa, reached Toronto this evening, proceeded at once to the meeting of Ward One Conservative Association and communicated to the meeting on behalf of the Dominion Government its intention to seek from Parliament another appeal to the British House for a further extension of its term of office. He said: "If constitutional considerations were alone regarded it would have been proper to have held an election in the autumn of 1914 or 1915.

"The higher consideration of the public interest and decent regard for public opinion were taken into account by the Government and an extension of the parliamentary term was proposed for reasons which apply with equal, if not greater force, to such further extension as will make an election unnecessary during the continuance of the war.

"For these reasons the Government proposes to ask for such further extension as may be necessary, and upon the Liberal Party will rest the responsibility of determining whether a war election shall be avoided or whether party strife shall be precipitated and carried on during the pending struggle."

Causes Surprise. The announcement coming on the heels of the public utterances of Hon. Robert Rogers and other ministers of the crown, intimating governmental eagerness and determination to face the electors, was manifestly a profound surprise to the meeting. It was received in silence, forwarded by some applause. Hon. Mr. Kemp made it from typewritten manuscript after a speech vigorously defending Premier Borden from the general criticism which had been directed at himself and the Government recently, and an enumeration of things for which the minister urged that Sir Robert and his colleagues deserved much credit that they were not getting.

ONTARIO LIBERALS FROM ALL RIDINGS TO GATHER NOV. 24

Annual Conference Expected To Be Largest in History.

ORGANIZATION A FEATURE

TORONTO, Nov. 3.—Prospects point to one of the largest, most representative and most important Liberal conferences ever held in the province at the forthcoming annual meeting of the Ontario General Reform Association, to be held in Toronto on Friday, November 24. It is anticipated that there will be present delegations from every riding in the province.

According to arrangements completed by the executive the morning session of the association will be devoted to matters of business and the election of officers. The afternoon and, if necessary, the evening sittings are, however, to be placed at the full disposal of visiting delegates, from whom are invited expressions of their views and counsel as to matters of Liberal policy, patriotic enterprise and party organization.

The announcement is made that the party leaders, many former cabinet ministers and prominent Liberals from all parts of the province are expected to be present. Speeches will be delivered, but primary importance is attached to the discussions, in which it is anticipated the delegates themselves will take part.

GOLD FOR ARGENTINA.

[Canadian Press.] New York, Nov. 4.—The steamer Byron, leaving today for Buenos Ayres, carries a shipment of \$1,450,000 gold from local banking institutions. Of this sum \$1,000,000 was sent by a trust company, presumably in connection with British purchases of supplies in Argentina. The remainder representing two transactions, one of \$250,000 and the other of \$200,000, was exchange business. The movement of gold to Argentina was indicated recently by the rise of Argentine exchange to a point where it was more profitable to remit gold than to send funds by check or cable.

TIDE OF BATTLE IS SWINGING AGAIN TO THE RUSSIAN FORCES

Successes in Volhynia and Galicia Reported.

REOCCUPY OLD LINES

Stokhod Trenches Once More in Hands of Czar's Army.

PETROGRAD, Nov. 3.—Via London.—Infantry fighting continues in Galicia and in Volhynia, with slight success in both regions for the Russians, according to the official statement issued by the war office today. The Russians have reoccupied part of the Stokhod in Volhynia, and east of the village of Lipnicadolina, in Galicia, the Russians have pushed back the Austro-Germans in some places.

The statement reads: "Transylvania front: No news has been received. "Dobruja front: There have been no events of importance.

Push Enemy Back. "Western (Russian) front: On the River Stokhod in the region of Vitonej and Alexandrovsk (five miles north of Kielin), fighting continues. Here a battalion of one of our regiments succeeded in pushing back the enemy, who had occupied part of our trenches on the western bank of the Stokhod.

In the region of the heights east of the village of Lipnicadolina our detachments, after having destroyed opposing wire entanglements, pushed back the enemy in some places. A dense fog hindered the work of the artillery on the River Bystritsa. In the region of the village of Krivich our scouts, together with a platoon, made a surprise attack from the front and flank, on an enemy company, dispersing them and taking thirteen prisoners.

Caucasus front: On Wednesday two of our aviators bombarded large Turkish encampments near Lahak Majdan, northwest of Nurek, and near Tykolan, southeast of Cholyk, and also two bridges over the Euphrates, near Sagan. In the region of Sakik (Penzin) our scouts captured fifteen head of cattle transporting wheat."

HOW GERMANS PUT IT. BERLIN, Nov. 3.—(By wireless to Sayville).—"No success whatever was obtained by the Russians in their recent determined attack on the eastern front, which apparently was launched with the purpose of helping the Rumanians, and may be considered the last of the ramifications of Gen. Brussiloff's great offensive movement, says a semi-official review of the campaign. It continues:

"On the Narayuvka, in Galicia, the Russians sustained a severe and sanguinary defeat in a battle that lasted seven days, from October 15 to October 22, and were similarly defeated in an engagement on October 20. During the progress of this fighting, Turkish troops especially distinguished themselves.

"The Russians likewise paid a large price for their attacks upon our positions on the Suez, and may be considered the last of the ramifications of Gen. Brussiloff's great offensive movement, says a semi-official review of the campaign. It continues:

"These attacks, which were repeatedly launched in strong force, resulted in no relief for the Rumanians."

HAD BRONCHITIS FOR YEARS

Referring to the fighting on the Rumanian front, the review says: "The Austro-German attacks in the Carpathian passes and in Dobruja continue in full swing, although the Rumanians are making efforts to check them by rapidly concentrating their reserves."

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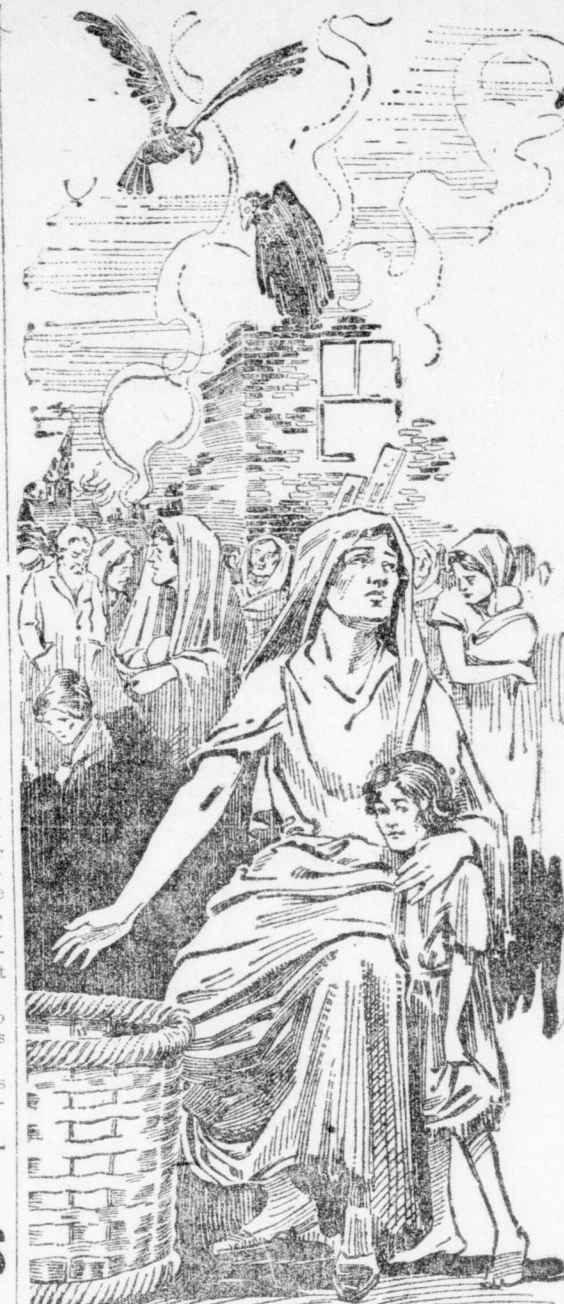
