PARIS, March 28 .- The chances of the League of Nations participating in the Genoa conference were reduced to a minimum today by the action of the council of the league in simply referring to the general secretary Italy's invitation to send to Genoa technical experts from the league organization for consultative purposes

It is known that Sir Eric Drummond, the league's general secretary regards such partial and vague participation as is proposed in the invitation beneath the dignity of the league, and it appears probable he will find it inadvisable to take the league's technical men away from the work they are already engaged

The members of the council, after consulting their governments, decided the invitation was too vague to warrant a formal acceptance, but they preferred to leave action upon the general secretary rather than formally to decline,
