## Volcano Erupts, 'Quake Following, Damages Tokio City

TOKIO, April 26.—A heavy earth shock, centering in Tokio, occurred at 10:15 this morning. Considerable damage was done to buildings in the city and their contents. The earthquake was precedel by eruption yesterday at Mount Asm-Yama, 90 miles northwest of Tokio, which broke out with a loud report pouring forth volumes of ashes, stones and smoke.
