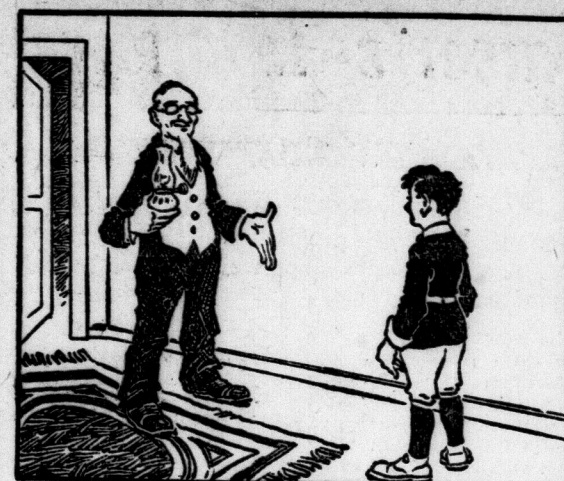
JACK DAW'S ADVENTURES.
